WILLIAMS BURNED TO DEATH IN GRUE-SOME FASHION BY GEORGIA FIENDS

Chained to Stake and Torch Applied-Governor Dorsey May Propose Measures to End Pogroms in His Final Message to Legislature.

MOULTRIE, Ga., June 18.—Following indignant denials by men prominent in the political affairs of Georgia and supposedly her "best citizens" of the charges of burnings, lynchings and other forms of mob violence against Negroes contained in a pamphlet recently issued by Governor Hugh M. Dorsey, some of the "best citizens" of this State gathered on the Court House lawn here and took John Henry Williams, a Negro, from the sheriff, who turned him over to them without the least show of resistance, carried him to the edge of a pond, chained him to a stump, saturated his body with gasoline, applied the torch and burned him to death in the most gruesome manner-Georgia fashion.

Governor Hugh M. 




