

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

### DEAN PICKENS ON TITLES AND HONORS

TN the New York News and Chicago Defender of July 29 Wm. Pickens, former dean of Morgan College and an official of the N. A. A. C. P., in a column and a half of perfervid rhetoric. published his reply to a letter from the Rt. Hon. Marcus Garvey, in which the latter informed him that His Highness the Potentate would confer an honor or title upon him for distinguished services at the court reception on August 10.

Prof. Pickens declined the proffered honor because he was of the opinion that the Rt. Hon. Marcus Garvey "conceded the justice of the aim of the Ku Klux Klan to crush and repress colored Americans and incidentally other racial and religious groups in the United States."

We believe that Prof. Pickens erred in his interpretation Marcus Garvey's utterances. We believe that the latter did not so much concede the justice of the aim of the Ku Klux Klan, but rather recognized it as a force to be reckoned with. Some friendly critics think that my attitude towards the social status of the Negro should be more broadly socialistic and less chauvinistically racial as it seems to them. 


