

The Home of the Blacks

We love Liberia, because it is the only country in the world that offers a home to the distressed black man. The people of Liberia, who are part of us, realize that by a unity of purpose and ideal we can build up a nation of which each and every one of us may be proud.

Let us concentrate in doing this, and we can do it in no better way than by universally falling behind the program of the Universal Negro Improvement Association at this time.

Get Ships Now

Our chief need now is for ships and money; ships to convey the Colonists and to remove the raw materials from Africa to the western world, and money to finance the plan of construction. The Association is now endeavoring to raise \$125,000 more for the purchase of the ship to carry our first group of Colonists. 





The Universal Negro Improvement Association is now starting to carry out its colonization plans for helping in the cultural, industrial, agricultural, economic, educational and social development of the black republic of Liberia, west coast of Africa, as a permanent home for the scattered Negroes of the world who desire to live in a country of their own where they may enjoy the benefits of real freedom, liberty and democracy.

The good people of Liberia anxiously welcome to their country their hearts and their ideals the sober-minded, industrious, law-abiding, ambitious Negroes of America, West Indies, South and Central America and Canada who desire to settle among them and become a part of a peaceful growing black nation.
