SECOND PAYMENT MADE ON SHIP OF NEGRO RACE

Fellow Men of the Negro Race, Greeting:

We are marching steadily on toward the goal of progress. The Universal Negro Improvement Association has stirred up the sleeping members of our race to the extent that everywhere we are redoubling our efforts and energies to put over the program of African Redemption, not only in the political sense, but in the industrial, commercial, educational and religious sense. Today we wake up to find ourselves marching toward the great objective with every man and woman prepared to do his and her part. Just a couple of weeks ago we acquired our first ship for the Black Cross Navigation and Trading Company, a vessel of 5,300 tons. This ship is to blaze the trail of African industrialism and commercialism, carrying to and fro our freight and passengers, taking from the Africans, South and Central Americans and West Indians their raw products, bringing them to the American markets and taking back to these peoples our finished products manufactured by our own hands in our own factories, where we will employ members of our own race.

Help Make Payment for Ship

We made a substantial payment on this first ship and a second payment was made on the 13th instant. There is another large payment to be made on the 13th of October, and we want every member of the Negro race throughout the length and breadth of the world to send in his and her loan to enable us to meet this payment. We want \$48,000 more to complete the payment for our ship. We must have it within another couple of weeks. Those who have not loaned their \$25, \$50, \$100 or \$500 yet, now is the time for you to come to the assistance of the Association. We want money, not only to pay for the ship, but to capitalize the starting of the business of the corporation. Let us all remember that the Universal Negro Improvement Association cannot put over its program except it is supported by its membership and those who are in sympathy with it.

cessfully the ideal that we are striving to attain. The Negro race, large in its dimensions and scattered over the globe as it is, ought to be able not only to have one ship, but hundreds of ships flying the colors of the Red, the Black and the Green over the seven seas. We have made a start. Let us keep it up. Let us go about it in a business-like way. The Negro who would not help to establish his race in commerce and industry has absolutely no sense of responsibility. For us to attain the higher heights in religion, politics, art, science, literature and education, we must have first a solid industrial and commercial foundation. When we can provide employment for ourselves, when we can feed ourselves, then we can talk politics, discuss our views on religion and find time to indulge in the fine arts. Until then you are at the mercy of the other fellow who feeds you, and that is the condition of our race throughout the world today. That is why we have no racial opinion, because we are dependent upon the other fellow for the support that we get, and naturally he dictates our policies, shapes our views, and directs our opinions. To free ourselves from this we must take the initiative in building for ourselves, and that is what the Universal Negro Improvement Association wants each and every one to do in supporting the Black Cross Navigation and Trading Company.

Men and women, let us have ships, and still more ships. Let us belt the globe with the merchant marine of our race. Let our ships be sailing into the ports of England, France and

Germany of Europe; into the ports of Asia, into Japan, China and India; into the ports of Africa, South, East, West and North, and into the ports of the different countries of the Americas. Let our ships carry the same raw materials and finished product of the one country into the next as the ships of other races are doing. It is only when we start to do business in this concrete way can we develop a strong and healthy independent race, out of which we hope will ultimately come a great political freedom culminating in the redeemed republic of Africa.

WAYS OF THE TYRANT IN GUINEA AND NEW GUINEA

BLACK WOMEN IN NEW GUINEA, UNDER AUSTRALIAN ADMINISTRATION, VICTIMS OF WHITE RULE AND LIBERTINISM

Disgusting Incidents Mark Australia's "Colonial" Ambitions—New List of Inhuman Atrocities—Men and Women Abused—Official Terrorism Goes Unchecked

Daily Mr. J. A. Begley continues to reveal facts about the atrocities practiced by the Australian mandated administration of New Guinea, that are almost unbelievable in their revolting brutality. Flogging, arson, and seduction are the common incidents of the official life of the territory, and few of the white men who loathe the scenes they have daily to witness have the pluck to expose one of the most revolting sores that have ever disgraced a British government.

Mr. Begley reported often and vigorously against the atrocities he was forced to witness. So far did his protests go that he was at length arrested by black police boys acting under the orders of one of these "white Australia" placed in front and imprisoned until one of the few white men who have some respect for their color came along and treated that he be released. Free again, Mr. Begley protested vigorously against the treatment he had received, and, incidentally, received from Mr. Mackintosh, late Court Registrar at Rabaul, a letter, stating that use of no justification for the treatment. Further, this officer wrote his appreciation of a fearless and conscientious officer, and stated that such conduct had a moral effect on evil-doers.

Police boys flog the natives by orders of the white officials, and without orders. Further, the police boys are themselves flogged. Some of them are flogged with a piece of kundu, cane, about an inch thick and three or four feet long. Cases are known where the boys have been forced to remain in bed for days after a beating, and it was necessary to administer morphine to relieve the pain.

Police boy Niri, now at Elitapa, was beaten and for days had a temperature of 104. Blood flowed from this boy's ears and nose, and he was out about the body very badly.

Mr. Begley cautioned the official, Mr. W., not to beat the natives, as he might again. Almost immediately, he says, this "white official" went over to the camp and gave the natives a thrashing. Finally, the cruel methods of this man so terrorized the boys that the police boy, Sergeant Tigon, ran away.

Tigon had several nasty cuts on his back when he fled from the camp. He made for Murik, and by the time he got there his wounds were so painful that he was forced to "sit down" for several days. Finally, a little better at the end of that time the natives placed him on a canoe and took him, by sea, to Wevrek, 20 miles away.

At Wevrek, Tigon met Mr. F., a district officer, and told him that he had come to "make court." Mr. F. did nothing. No "court" or inquiry was held; nobody was punished. It was only a case of a man being beaten.

About the middle of September, 1923, members of the Federal Parliament visited New Guinea, and Mr. Begley states that the police boy, Tigon and other boys, went to the Parliament to make their case. Mr. F. M. Forde (Cape Breton, N. S.), was of the party, and no doubt heard the boys state their case against the administration officials.

Hostages Are Taken
The following notes from a diary that Mr. Begley kept during a tour of the country are illuminating as to the actions of these "protectors of the natives":

Sept. 6. Last night Mr. D., D. O., slept in a tent about fifty yards from the natives. For the past several days he has carried a native woman breast-feeding a child at his side. The natives say that the woman was forced to sleep with the white man.

Sept. 7. The native woman was handed over to the patrol officer. This day at the village of Biligi.

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SPANIARDS BEGIN DECISIVE BATTLE Fighting Moors Take Vow Against Foes at Sacred Tomb

TANGIER, Sept. 15.—What will probably prove to be the decisive engagement in this year's Spanish-Moorish warfare is stated to have already begun. Spanish columns, reported to be in all 40,000 strong, are advancing from Tetuan into the enemy country with the intention of converging on Sbehan and relieving that isolated town.

The Spanish columns, which are actively engaged near Tetuan, will not attempt the relief of Sbehan unless they succeed first in clearing the Tetuan district of the enemy. Very heavy fighting is reported.

Fighting is stated to be general all over the southwestern district near Tetuan and along the road which connects Tetuan with Tangier, which today is again held by the enemy. Jabala tribesmen are holding a mass meeting today at the sacred tomb of Khalid Abdeslam in front to accuse the tribes. Vow to continue the holy war will be taken, it is said, by tribes that have so far held aloof.

The tribesmen will proceed direct from the tomb to attack the Spanish columns proceeding up the valley toward Sbehan. The results of a next few days' fighting will probably finally decide the policy of Spain in Morocco.

Japanese Watchful
TOKIO, Sept. 15.—The Japanese Cabinet today discussed the Chinese situation and decided that the news from China was too greatly colored by propaganda to warrant a definite line of action as yet. But it was decided to issue warning that vigorous action would be taken if Japan in the three Eastern provinces of Manchuria were molested, or if undue Chinese influence were exerted in Korea.

Japan, it is stated, "strongly desires to remain neutral."

Did Not Discuss Action
The Rev. O. Newton, pastor of the McKee's Rock Church, who nominated Dr. Trusty in the presbytery meeting, declared emphatically tonight that no part of conferences had preceded his action. There was no premeditation, he said.

"Not another man among the delegates knew that I intended to nominate Dr. Trusty," said Dr. Newton. "I myself did not know he would fare in the voting beside the fact that there was reason for assurance that Dr. Trusty or any other intelligent Negro would receive a square deal."

It seemed to me that the time had come for some practical recognition of the splendid work done by Dr. Trusty, church, the Grace Memorial, was the first Negro congregation organized in this presbytery, and it is not only logical and fair that if a Negro was to be chosen moderator the honor should go to him."

Those expressing dissent of Dr. Trusty's election were of doubtful distinction. It leads to weakness and to self-control, and to a habit of dishonesty. We may call "white lies" to avoid giving offense. The value of such subterfuge is questionable.

Dr. Frank J. Bryson, pastor of the fashionable First Church, North Side, nominated to oppose Dr. Trusty, was not present at the presbytery meeting.

Abasera Proves Cooley
It is declared this necessarily had diverse effect on his candidacy. It is asserted that many of those who contributed to the sixty-nine votes for Trusty which elected him were by one vote over his opponent would have voted for Bryson if they had known when they were asked to vote. Complications apparently unforeseen yesterday are pointed out as probable now, including the attitude of the members of the church.

NEGRO MODERATOR STIRS PITTSBURGH CHURCH CIRCLES

Heated Discussion Follows as Negro Is Named by Presbyterians—Attitude of Seminarians Towards New Leader in Doubt

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 17.—Election yesterday of the Rev. Charles H. Trusty, Negro, as Moderator of the Pittsburgh Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, has created a situation which will require all the diplomacy of the church's leaders to handle. No occurrence in the religious activities of this district has stirred so much heated discussion in years.

While a very large proportion of church workers, including the presbytery and outside, express approval of yesterday's action, there is a deep current of hostile sentiment easily discoverable.

Dr. Trusty himself and his warmer friends in the presbytery see nothing in the election other than a deserved recognition and the manifestation of a "bright Christian spirit."

"This is one of the most democratic elections in the country" said Dr. Trusty today. "The true spirit of brotherhood prevails among the clergy of our church in this district."

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THE CIVIL WAR RAGING IN CHINA

Revolt of Asia Against Occidental Domination Seen

BERLIN, Sept. 15.—The civil war raging in China is the first act in the tremendous revolt of Asia against Occidental domination, especially against the Americans and British, according to the view being expressed here in circles interested in Far Eastern affairs.

The writer of a striking article, covering most of the first page of this afternoon's Deutscher Zeitung, who is described as a diplomat well versed in Oriental matters, declares that Japan and Soviet Russia are busily pulling strings in China for the purpose of bringing about an alliance with the latter which shall eventually drive Occidentals out of Asia.

The United States and Britain, continues this writer, are already taking steps to thwart this scheme. According to the theory that is advanced, Japan first favored Chang Tso-lin, the Manchurian war lord, but later decided to support the Central Asiatic Government in Peking, believing that a strong central China, with Peking as the capital, would be the most valuable ally for Japan and Russia.

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The moves now on near Peking and the battles near Shanghai will decide China's fate, it is declared, and the words, they will determine whether the United States and England, through a victory by Chang Tso-lin, will forestall the attempt to oust them from the Orient, or whether Japan and Russia, through the victory of the Chinese republicans, will bring nearer the day when a triple alliance of Japanese, Russians and Chinese will throw down the United States and England.

AN ENGLISHMAN'S VIEWS ON BRITISH OFFICIAL MISRULE AND INEPTITUDE IN NIGERIA, WEST COAST, AFRICA

Traders and Producers Overtaxed and Overworked by Government Officials—More Freedom of Trade and Less Taxation Crying Needs—Traders or Tories?

Some months ago I wrote a disquisition on the trade relations of Germany and Great Britain. I had small notes, Chinese and British, concerning the trade relations of the two countries. I risked being called unpatriotic. My article appeared in the principal newspapers of both Nigeria and the Gold Coast, and also in the Westminster Gazette.

It was then widely reprinted by provincial journals; and later appeared in the New York Sun. From Germany I received several letters of thanks. The European Press, which is published in Munich, opened its column to a correspondence, which has lasted until now. "It is gratifying," my countrymen are wont to say, "to see that the right or wrong" may be all very well in time of war. Such a motto might be extended to be found both valuable on every day in moments of crisis.

Government Wasteful
The misapplying of public disquiet at this time centers on Government waste. We are conscious, we members of the government, that taxation is onerous, because we feel that the revenue is not being directed to right channels. There are, far too many officials; and far too many of them at exorbitantly high salaries. Amongst the masses of colored citizens in every West African colony, the general feeling is that the existing state of things is wholly unjust, and that the general welfare is being subordinated to the private interests of a few officials who are utterly regardless of the employment.

Hard words! But test them by common sense. Modify them, if need be, by local conditions. It is not, I repeat, that I am in any way opposed to the existing state of things in Nigeria; it is merely a statement of fact that the existing state of things is wholly unjust, and that the general welfare is being subordinated to the private interests of a few officials who are utterly regardless of the employment.

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HAITIAN LEADER CONFINED IN CELL FOUR FEET SQUARE



THE SAVAGE DISPOSITION TO FIGHT BORN IN THE SPIRIT

THERE was great outcry against the setting aside of Defense Day by the War Department, September 12, by the large number of people who do not love war but claim to love the ways of peace. These people thought that it was not a wise policy in the disturbed condition of the world for the people of the United States to make a show of armed strength. It was also declared that the people of Japan, when the country had peacefully defended in dealing with the question of immigration, would regard such a demonstration of armed strength as a warning to them that the nation was ready if the Japanese wanted to fight. This aspect of the matter may have been far fetched and it may not have depended upon the viewpoint.

How did the people of the United States answer the call to fight? The Negro World regards the answer as very significant. It is estimated that some 16,000,000 civilians turned out to show their individual obligation and responsibility under the new national defense program, and that 2,000,000 were enrolled in the various fighting units. All this shows the disposition of the nation to fight if need be. Although we also believe in peace and would eliminate war entirely between Nations as well as between individuals, we regard the showing of national fighting strength as a good and healthy sign. When it is well known that a nation is ready to fight those who want to assault it think wisely before doing so. It is the same way with the individual. Those who know he will fight in defense of what is his and what he holds dear to him will hesitate to fight a fight upon him.

The fact that this savage disposition is born of the spirit of man and is one of his bone and flesh of his flesh. He is not alone in this destructive tendency. It runs through all animal life, all bird life, all fish life, all insect life. The strong prey on the weak because of selfish greed, or prejudice in some phase of its hydra heads. The children on the streets, going in and coming out of the school buildings, begin roughing and end up often in the hospital ward that means bad feeling and a plentiful flow of blood. If a peacemaker shows up they turn upon him as the Israelites did upon Moses. As it is with the children so it is with the grown-ups and nations.

INDEPENDENCE IN POLITICS—WHAT IS IT, ANYHOW?

Just at this time, in the throes of a Presidential campaign, we are hearing much about independence in politics, especially among Negroes, who have been supporting the Republican party for fifty-six years, or since the elections in 1868, and who have got nothing out of their voting that they put in it since 1876, when the Republican party, by its victory in the State organizations in the Southern States and with them the Negro Republicans, to save Mr. Rutherford B. Hayes and the Presidency, began to consider the Negro in part as a political tool, and abandoned him entirely in the administration of President Harding, who repudiated them and left them to their own devices. President Coolidge has done very little to undo the treacherous work of Warren G. Harding. I believe he cannot very well, but he has gone about proving it by being as cautious as a politician who wants a reelection rather than as a statesman who makes principle the guiding star of his public service. The Negro has had too much of that in Republican policy since 1876.

THE SPANIARDS FAIL TO CONQUER THE AFRICAN TRIBESMEN

THE latest news from the battle front in Morocco is that the Spanish army, under the direct command of Prime Minister and Dictator Primo de Rivera, as a result of crushing defeats at the hands of the African tribesmen, has decided to evacuate the greater part of the Spanish-Moroccan zone. Abdol Krim has the Spanish dictators whipped. The outcome of the long and costly efforts of the Spaniards to conquer the African tribesmen have been only blood and money loss and vexation of Spanish pride and arrogance; these latter being great possessions of the Spaniards. The Spanish people have grown weary of the cost in men and money of the fight against the tribesmen and there is persistent rumor that Dictator Primo de Rivera may be thrown out of power. Even the Spanish throne, it is intimated, may be shaken.

The European powers do not look with satisfaction upon Spanish failure to conquer the North African tribesmen. They have their own in Africa who show very unsteady and restless disposition, and the possibility of trouble is ever present. Reports of success of tribesmen in one part of Africa reach all of the others with the fear which the blacks have been forced by bloody wars to have of the European whites. It was only recently that Jan Christian Smuts, the fallen premier of the Union of South Africa, bluntly lamented the fact that the "Natives no longer regard the whites as gods." Destroy the white superiority myth among the African tribesmen and the tribesmen will ultimately throw off the white man's overlordship. Spanish failure to conquer the Moroccans is helping to destroy that myth.

RACE HORRORS IN AUSTRALIA ARE UNSPEAKABLY VILE

WE are indebted to The Labor Weekly and the Labor Daily of Sydney, Australia, for exposure of horrors in the mandated territory of New Guinea, in the Commonwealth of Australia, which are unspeakably vile, and which appeal from the injustice of the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia to the League of Nations for searching investigation of the condition of the natives under the administration of the Government of Australia. It does not seem possible that any such crimes against the weak and defenseless could develop under the British flag as have been shown to exist in South Africa and Australia.

As far as New Guinea is concerned, the Labor Weekly and the Labor Daily of Sydney have made out a clear case against the Government of Australia for conniving at the enslavement and torture of the native blacks, for the forcible seizure of black wives to be concubines for white men, and for the common practice of white men living with black women as a convenience, to be cast off their bastard children when the interest of the white libertines appeared to require it. Such things are impossible anywhere else. We have had much of it in our Southern States; we have some of it now in our Southern States. We should have none of it anywhere, and The Negro World will continue to protest and fight against it, in the name of the Universal Negro Improvement Association, wherever it is found to exist.

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OLDEST RACE PROPERTY OWNED BY BETHEL

Located in Philadelphia and Purchased by Richard Allen for a Blacksmith Shop

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—Probably the oldest piece of property owned by any colored organization in America is that owned by the corporation, Bethel Church, Philadelphia, the member of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. This property is located on the east side of South Sixth street between Pine and Lombard streets. It was deeded to the African Methodist Episcopal Church, June 21, 1811, one year after the Negroes had in the State of Pennsylvania formed in Philadelphia in 1811 by Richard Allen, Peter Spencer, Daniel Coles and others. The original plot was purchased by Richard Allen in 1812 and was the site of the famous blacksmith shop church.
