Fellow Men of the Negro Race, Greeting:

Once more it is my good fortune to thank you for your splendid conduct in this, our hour of trial, and for your continued loyalty to the cause. The enemy thought that with my incarceration the organization which I founded and which has weathered every gale, thanks to your unfaltering support, would disintegrate and crumble, but again they are disappointed. You have shown in no uncertain terms that a new Negro is here, here to stay, and that he will not be sidetracked from his lofty and noble purpose by any agency that mortal man can summon.

I have an important message for the members of the organization this week, and I sincerely trust that each and every member will read it carefully and govern himself or herself accordingly.
