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TURN OUT THE TRAITORS' IS HON. MARCUS GARVEY'S APPEAL TO DELEGATES IN CONVENTION IN RINGING MESSAGE

We give below a verbatim report of the Hon. Marcus Garvey's message to the delegates assembled at Detroit in Convention. This message was read by Mr. Van Lowe at the opening session of the Convention on Sunday afternoon, March 14:

Fellow-Members, Ladies and Gentlemen:-

It is good and becoming that you have called your-selves together to discuss and regulate the vital affairs of your great organization. It would have been the pleasure of my life to be present in your midst today, but circumstances that you and I have no control over tend to keep us apart. This was to be expected, hence our sorrow is modified, knowing that to those who serve the cause of humanity go the thorns of life. We must expect to suffer, and, some of us, to pass through the vale of tears, but with the sublime knowledge that our Heavenly Father has decreed the redemption of our race and our final triumph over our enemies.

Coming Together for Serious Reason

Your coming together is for a serious reason. Since my incarceration, undue advantage has been taken of your organization and your interests. Those who planned and caused my imprisonment did not hesitate to work upon the leading representatives left behind to carry out their purpose of the complete demolition of the organization. The very fact that this convention has been suddenly called and not in the usual manner and in the customary place is proof that something is terribly wrong in our affairs.

Because the organization has been under the control of others during my imprisonment, I was unable, even though I made several attempts early in 1925 and again in 1926, and through the Second Volume of my book, to inform you so as to have you rise as one man to protect your interests before it became too late. My efforts were skillfully suppressed and the wreck of evil intent gradually went on until we were ultimately successful in calling you together to stop the traitors in their work of selfishness and destruction.

There are many ways of hurting a great cause, such as ours, with the appearance of serving it. We have been injured with impunity. Because of the peculiar nature of our effort, it is very easy for a traitor within to sell himself and yet pretending to be serving us as a friend.

Influence of Evil Forces

Judas served Christ up to the final hour. Did he not ask "Is it I?"

For years I have kept our organization from falling under the evil forces and influences operating against us, and, because of that, the forces were not disposed to treat with me through my stand against them, but they have sought every opportunity to trip and influence and use those associated with me, to defeat the cause. They have succeeded in roping in the unfaithful leaders I left behind, to the extent that some of them openly flouted my

authority and rebelled against my timely warnings and advice, hence the ruin that they have brought for the satisfaction of our enemies.

If my instructions had been followed, and if my counsel had been taken, I feel sure that there would have been no need for this emergency convention. But I am glad that all is not lost, for by your timely action we can save ourselves from the corrupt gang and our enemies and push forward a stronger organization that shall lead the way to African redemption and the race emancipated.

Do not be afraid. You are now on the threshold of international success. While the unfaithful within have been working for the enemy, I have held the line, through my wife and other agencies, and all you have to do is to bring up your forces of organization for the final international battle of Africa redeemed. The League of Nations and the Locarno Council might not have listened to the voice in the wilderness, but as sure as there is a God, the sun of Africa is rising and before many years, shall shed its light upon a united people, free and happy in a country of their own. Through the loyal service of my wife I have gained many friends in the white race to our cause. They are also working hard to help us, but we must get rid of our traitors and liars, for with them we can accomplish nothing. We have won the thoughtful sentiment of the world. We must now organize this sentiment for the final triumph of our cause. Remember you are strong through the unity of forces and right now you must come together as never before to oust and defeat the enemy in our midst.

Influence of Studied Speech

Let no fine, studied speech move you at this time. Be moved only by that which is from the heart. Let real actions speak and not words. Words are cheap.

The liars have deceived the people in New York as to what they have done to save the organization. Investigation will show that they made hay while the sun was shining. They have sold and mortgaged everything they

found that I left in the hands of the people. It took no ability to do that. A child can destroy your property but it takes ability, intelligence and courage to accumulate. That is why I hate the rogues for their lies and deception. Years of accumulation of property and other interests have been frittered away to please the enemy. How can the rogues who helped them by negligence, duplicity and otherwise, have nerve enough to appeal to you for further support to injure yourselves?

This convention is for electing real men to protect your interests. They must act as men. They allow no sympathy for evil-doers, otherwise they neglect your interests. I ask that you support this convention in every way. The men who called the convention did it with my full sanction and approval. The New York gang and their cohorts have been raising the cry that the convention

hot called constitutionally. When you are dealing with rascals you act urgently, irrespective of technicalities in the constitution. If a murderer is about to kill you would you resort to the technicality of non-defense "thou shalt not kill?" Your first duty should be to protect yourself and that is just what you are doing at this convention. I have prepared a report for the convention which will be read by Mr. Van Lowe at the business session tomorrow. In it I have laid out the facts and charges; you will deal with the report, with all statements and documents attached, after it is read.

Returning Thanks to Friends

I must return thanks to you for the interest you have shown in me and the protection you have given my wife against the gang that is trying to harm her so as to further crush me. She has been a good, true and loyal wife and I know that I can depend on you to protect her while I suffer for you. She is all I have in the world. She makes me proud of the women of my race. Hold up her hand against the enemy. She has helped me hold the African field together and is doing, through our friends, splendid work in Liberia to win out, while the gang in New York sells out and diverts the program. She has lined up powerful friends to our cause and with righteousness we are bound to win. Our friends in Virginia are getting the Assembly there to help us. I have requested the Committee of Presidents to have our petition sent to Congress that has been neglected by the unfaithful in New York, as also to have you in your various States petition your Legislatures, as Virginia is doing, to create for us a nation in Africa. Go to it and never say die until Africa is won for the Negro race.

Let the convention be a ringing success and after you have turned out the Judases, I shall feel happy that our labor was not in vain.

Hold fast to the colors, pray for God's guidance and strength in the fight for liberty and surely we shall win.


