Fellow-Men of the Negro Race, Greeting:

There comes a time in the life of every race and history of every nation when a decisive stand must be taken for the preservation and well-being of that race and nation. Such a time has come in the life of the Negro, because of which we are now sounding the clarion call of race unity, love and pride, hoping that the four hundred million members will respond, so as to make it possible for us to look the future in the face with a united front.

The world is undergoing a state of reorganization wherein each and every group of the great human family seeks an expression of its own will. The keenness of the age brings out a rivalry among races and nations that makes it possible for only those who are strongly organized and well prepared to survive the eternal conflict. It is in such a competition that the Negro is called upon at this time to play his part. We must, as a people, decide for ourselves now whether we shall go forward or backward in the competitive program of races and nations.

Once upon a time our race relied upon human charity and sympathy, but today the world is void of these attributes, and we are forced either to do for ourselves or die by being relegated to the scrap heap of humanity. The space accommodation for races and nations is becoming so narrow and circumscribed as to suggest that in a short while only the fittest of the great human groups will survive, the weaker ones having, perforce, to die or move on to make room for those who are strong enough to hold their own.

Calamity of Extermination

The calamity of extermination faces the Negro, and it is because of that that the Universal Negro Improvement Association is organizing the world over so that through a united course we can so settle ourselves as to insure permanent existence.

We cry out for a united Africa, for a liberated country. This sentiment has made the circuit of the world, but still there are millions who have not yet made up their minds to join in the holy crusade. It is for them that those of us who make up the Universal Negro Improvement Association labor, because we who have caught the vision cannot have it realized without the assistance of those who suffer with us, because they are of our kind. Hence, our effort is to convert them to the way of seeing things as they are, and realizing that it is only through united effort, on the part of all Negroes, that we can truly free ourselves and liberate our country.

I am appealing to each and every Negro who has not yet aligned himself or herself actively with the work of the Universal Negro Improvement Association to do so during the year 1926. In unity there is strength. Why then shall we not stand together? Next Sunday, April 25, a worldwide campaign for members and funds will be started, and I sincerely trust that every Negro with red blood in his veins, every lover of true liberty, will do his or her best to make it an unqualified success. And remember that one million dollars subscribed in three months is worth three times that sum subscribed over a period of nine months. It is money, supporting the determination to achieve, that will hasten the day of our deliverance. Let us demonstrate to a critical world, a world disposed to regard the Negro as less than a human being, that we have arrived. Rally wholeheartedly to the support of your organization and so assist in making "Africa for the Africans" a reality.
