MARCUS GARVEY AND THE NEGRO'S FIGHT FOR LIBERTY

Negroes Must Themselves Carve The Way To True Liberty And Democracy, Depending On The Good Graces Of None

The following is an excerpt from a speech delivered by the Hon. Marcus Garvey at Newport News, Va., on October 25, 1919. Inset is a short treatise on "The Character of Races," which appears in Volume II of "Philosophy and Opinions of Marcus Garvey":

"It falls to the province of every black man and every black woman to be a member of the Universal Negro Improvement Association, because there is but one purpose before us, which is the purpose of liberty—that liberty Patrick Henry spoke about in the Legislature of Virginia over one hundred and forty years ago. We New Negroes of America declare that we desire liberty or we will take death. (Cheers.) They called us out but a few months ago to fight three thousand miles away in Europe to save civilization, to give liberty and democracy to the other peoples of the world. And we fought so splendidly, and after we died, after we gave up our blood, and some of us survived and returned to our respective countries, in America, in the West Indies, in Central America and in Africa, they told us, as they told us in the past, that this country is the white man's country.

Position of Menials

"What is it but menial opportunities for you where you live in contact with white men? Because they have told us that in America, because they have told us under the government of Great Britain that our opportunities are limited when we come in contact with white men, we say the war is not over yet. The war must go on; only that the war is not going on in France and Flanders, but the war will go on in the African plains, there to decide once and for all in the very near future whether black men are to be serfs and slaves, or black men are to be free men.

"We have decreed that black men are going to be free as white men are free or as

THE CHARACTER OF RACES

Black and white are proportionately bad as well as proportionately good, living under the same conditions and environments of our imperfect civilization.

All beauty, virtue and goodness are the exclusive attributes of no one race. All humanity have their short-comings; hence no statement of mine, at any time, must be interpreted as a wholesale praise of or attack upon any race, people or creed.

There are good and bad Catholics, Protestants, Jews and Klansmen. I would not wholesalely condemn any one group of the human race for the selfish good of another. The Negro needs as much moral reformation as anyone else. He lies, he steals and he breaks the commandments of God like any other sinner, and his crimes merit the same punishment as meted out to others. No one can influence me to be against Jews because they are Jews, Catholics because they are Catholics, or Klansmen because they are Klansmen. I condemn evil wheresoever I find it, in friend or foe, but I do not carry prejudice to the innocent because of their friendship for, or association with, the evildoer, for whom they are not responsible.—"Philosophy and Opinions of Marcus Garvey," Vol. II.

yellow men are free. We have declared that if there is to be a British Empire, if there is to be a German Empire, if there is to be a Japanese Empire, if there is to be a French Republic and if there is to be an American Republic, then there must be a black republic of Africa, (Cheers.)

Hid the Book from the Negro

"The New Negro has given up the idea of white leadership. The white man cannot lead the Negro race any longer. He was able through our ignorance to lead us for over three hundred years since he took us from Africa, but the New Negro has learned enough now. When the white man took the black man from Africa he took him under a camouflage. He said to the Queen of England that he was taking the black man from Africa for the purpose of civilizing and Christianizing him. But that was not his purpose. The white man's purpose for taking the Negro from his native land was to make a slave of him, to have free labor. Some

of us were brought to the Southern States of this country, some of our brothers and sisters were taken to Central America and others were taken to the West Indian Islands, and we labored under the bonds of slavery for 250 years. The white man did not school us for 250 years. He hid the book from us, even the very Bible, and did not teach the Negro anything.

The Negro Made a Rush for the Book

"But God moves in a mysterious way, and He gave to us a Lincoln and a Victoria, and He said, 'You must set those people free,' and they did set us free. As soon as we were freed we made a rush to get the book, and we did get the book. We got the Bible first, and we began to sing songs and give praise to God, and that is why the Negro shouts so much in church. But after he was through with the first he got hold of the school book and went from his A B C to Z, and what has happened in fifty years? There is not a white man so educated that you cannot find a Negro to equal him. None in France, none in England, none in America to beat the Negro educationally, and because we stand equal with him we say no longer shall the white man lead us, but we shall lead ourselves.

Completing the Education of the Negro

"If we had not a complete training in knowledge before 1914 in that we only knew the book and were only able to read and write, they of themselves gave us training and placed two million of us in the army and gave us gun and powder and taught us how to use them. That completed the education of the Negro. Therefore, tonight the Negro stands complete in education. He knows how to read his book, he can reason, plan and build, and he knows how to use the sword and the gun. And because he can do these things so splendidly, he is determined that he shall carve the way for himself to true liberty and democracy which the white man denied him after he was called out to shed his blood on the battlefields of France and Flanders."





Journalism Head Quits; Calls University "Reactionary"

ST. PAUL, June 2,-Declaring that the University of Minnesota has been "notoriously deaf to the demands for sound journalistic training," Ruel R. Barlow, head of the department of journalism since 1920, announced his resignation late today, effective at the close of the school year.

Mr. Barlow criticized what he termed

the "reactionary" attitude in the arts college. He charged that "every man who has been an instructor in journalism at Minnesota has been squelched in his attempts to provide adequate journalistic training."

Barlow denied that he wanted to be director of the School of Journalism, funds for which were provided by a \$350,000 endowment by a former publisher here.

Mr. Barlow added that older and bigger men in the ranks of journalism teachers who might have been appointed to head the school "have not been eager to hazard their positions for one at Minnesota."
