U. S. Urged to Name Commission to Study Industrial Possibilities — Taxation Heavy and Unemployment Rife-Public Health Low

Representatives of the sugar and other agricultural interests of Porto Rico have appeared before Federal authorities at Washington, asking for the appointment of a commission to study the industrial possibilities of their country. They have pointed out that Porto Rico, dependent upon agriculture alone, is in financial distress

and has 400,000 persons unemployed. Seven prominent Porto Ricans passed several weeks at the capital in support of their plea.
