

Hundreds of Thousands, White and Black, Dissatisfied At the Imprisonment of Marcus Garvey, Says Prominent White Paper

The following editorial, headed "A Tribute to Garvey," appeared in the Buffalo Evening Times (White) of Thursday, December 2, 1926. In this article the Times reiterates its belief that the Hon. Marcus Garvey was the victim of a trick statute and that he was guilty of no 'conscious wrong in the promotion of the movement which he espoused:

A TRIBUTE TO GARVEY

We have on more than one occasion pointed out that a vast number of white people and hundreds of thousands of black people in this country regard with a sense of regret and dissatisfaction the manner in which Marcus A. Garvey, the Negro leader of the "Back to Africa" movement for his people, was sent to the Atlanta Penitentiary for a period of five years. The method of his conviction was via the well worn "using the mails to defraud" route. This statute is reputed to be a means of "getting" anyone it is the purpose to "get," when every other legalistic expedient fails.

His trial raises the ethical if not the legal question as to whether he was a properly qualified protector of his own rights. He acted as his own attorney, called himself as witness, asked and answered questions in the dual capacity of witness and attorney, and so fumbled his case as to excite mingled amusement, derision, amazement, and in all probability consequent prejudices on the part of the jury which brought in a verdict of conviction.


Now on the front page of the New York Times Book Review for November 21, 1926, Evans Clark, in discussing Professor Jerome Dowd's book on "The Negro in American Life," makes this passing reference to the Garvey movement:

"Mr. Dowd reviews, somewhat more briefly, other proposals for the solution of the Negro problem. Colonization he dismisses as inconceivable, although he does go out of his way to say that the Garvey movement is 'a matter of serious import, in every respect creditable to its leader and to all who are backing it'."

This is no idle tribute. Mr. Dowd is Professor of Sociology in the University of Oklahoma. A native of South Carolina, he has had opportunity to study the colored race during the years of his childhood, youth and manhood; and no one has delved more conscientiously into the problems which confront the Inter-racial Congress than Mr. Dowd. He is neither a theorist nor a partisan in the discussion of a question which looms large for the good or ill of future years. Probably no man in the country has a calmer viewpoint or more comprehensive knowledge as regards this whole subject. Mr. Clark says of him:

"For twenty years Mr. Dowd has given himself to an investigation of the Negro problem. Convinced that an understanding of the question 'would not be possible without a study of the Negro in his original habitats and in regions to which he had been transplanted,' Mr. Dowd has dug deep into Negro history and written several volumes on the subject. In addition he has found it necessary 'to make excursions into biology, anthropology, eugenics and psychology, all of which sciences have made valuable contributions to our understanding of racial problems'."

This is the man who does not hesitate to speak in the kindliest fashion of Marcus Garvey, even though the latter is at the moment in the Atlanta Penitentiary. It reminds one of the brave action of Roald Amundsen in standing by Dr. Cook. But it has this difference, that Cook and Amundsen have been and are personal friends, while Professor Dowd as a South Carolinian could not by any possibility have had any such intimate association with the "Back to Africa" leader. His outspoken tribute is therefore all the more significant, and it bears out the opinions frequently expressed in this paper. We have never believed, and we do not believe now, that Marcus Garvey was guilty of any conscious wrong in the promotion of a movement which he espoused as the only means, as he saw it, of social emancipation and industrial progress for his race.



"The social well-being of our country requires our constant effort for the amelioration of race prejudice and the extension to all elements of equal opportunity and equal protection under the laws which are guaranteed by the constitution. The Federal government especially is charged with this obligation in behalf of the colored people of the nation. Not only their remarkable progress, their devotion and their loyalty, but onr duty to ourselves under our claim that we are an enlightened people requires us to use all our power to protect them from the crime of lynching. Although violence of this kind has very much decreased, while any of it remains we can not justify neglecting to make every effort to eradicate it by law.

"The education of the colored race under government encouragement is proceeding successfully and ought to have continuing support. An increasing need exists for properly educated and trained medical skill to be devoted to the service of this race."

TOO MUCH DIAMOND YIELD TO MAINTAIN PRICES

From The New York World One really feels a pang of sympathy for those diamond magnates who have arrived in South Africa to induce the Union Government to limit the pro-

duction of diamonds by law. A few years ago, when these millionaires controlled virtually all the mines and strictly limited the output, they seemed sure of indefinite affluence. Then came one disaster after another. First it was the discovery of diamonds in Ger-man Southwest Africa, which was soon furnishing one-tifth of the diamonds of the world—the only important source outside South Africa. Fortunately the British Empire annexed the troublesome region and it came into the combine. Then the close of the war brought the forced sale of German Austrian, and, above all, Russian dia-monds by the aristocracy of these countries—a sale so heavy that the world market collapsed and many South African mines had to shut down. This was followed by economic de-pression in Europe and America, with another heavy blow to the market. And now, to crown the troubles of the own ers of De Beers and other famous pits, great alluvial deposits have been found in South Africa. The adven-turous diggers, without other capi-

tal than a spade, are actually producing more carats than the great centra The trouble with the diamond is that it is almost indestructible. Gold and platinum wear away, pearls lose their lustre, silks turn to dust, but the diamond is untouched by time.
