# Africans' Patience Not Eternal; **Nemesis Coming**

(Reprinted from Workers' Herald of South Africa)

In an article in the London "Star" Mr. William J. Clissold, of Bechuanaland, says:

"When seated comfortably in an express train, have you ever speculated about where vou might find yourself if the driver went mad, or the train were derailed? I have experienced such a sensation in Africa when watching a large body of natives working in the mines or at the docks. These sweating, multitudinous brown beings form the real power that enables white civilization in Africa to take its ease and advance in comparative luxury. But what if, one day, the same power were directed towards destroying, instead of supporting, white civilization? And what guarantee has the white man that it will not? Then the very skill and unity—Europe's magnificent gifts of Africa—will prove instruments of destruction.

"It is a thought to appal!

"For Africa's strength is not her gold or diamonds, or ivory, but her people. We are extraordinarily slow to realize this simple fact. But gradually the worth of the native is dawning on the minds of many white people, and those who know him best are making the discovery first. The wisest magistrates, teachers and missionaries unite in praising the adaptability and capacity which, given the chance, can turn an African, even in one generation, from a savage to a civilized man.

"Probably such a phenomenon has never been seen before. I have talked to an African chief who might, but for his color, have been a member of Parliament or a diplomat. Yet his childhood was spent in herding cattle on the veldt. Imagine a Dorsetshire peasant being transformed similarly.

"Undoubtedly we are increasing the efficiency of the African. directing it aright?

"There are roughly two policies held by the Europeans in Africa on the native question today: Development and repression. Both are generally held chiefly as a means to the progress of the European. Perhaps it is natural that the native sees them from a different angle.

"I was present at a native debate at Cape Town when the opinion was expressed that the only satisfactory solution of the 'Native Question' would be the withdrawal of all white people to the place whence they came. On the other side I have heard extreme white 'Repressionists' seriously suggest that the only salvation of South Africa lies in the complete segregation of native Africans in the barren regions of the desert where the Europeans cannot live.

"Even the new legislation, which is euphemistically known as 'Differential,' and which gives the Government the right to forbid natives to engage in skilled trades, is really, repression in disguise."

## Lord Olivier's Warning

And here it is interesting to read the quotation from a South African letter which Lord Olivier prints in his recent volume, "The Anatomy of African Misery": John Murray:

"The attitude of the colonists is obviously suicidal. They rely solely on machine guns for their supremacy. All the labor of the country is performed by natives. The whites are degenerating very quickly; they have been morally defeated by the native's power of suffering, by his tenacity of life, and, lastly but most importantly, by his sense of humor."

'The concluding words of Lord Olivier's masterly study are also worth ponderng:

"If the attempt to maintain the repression ist and color bar policy is persisted in, it is not the natives that in the long run are likely to be defeated. It is not they, but the whites, that have shown the first symptoms of degeneration—a degeneration entirely due to their own perverse social theory. . . . The native remains robust and virile, he can live on much less than the European, he increases faster in numbers. He is at present desirous and disposed to adapt himself to the life of the European community . . . but, although his patience is long, it is not likely to prove eternal in the face of the repressionist policy of which the Color Bar Law is so outspoken a declaration."

### WHO CAUSED GARVEY'S **IMPRISONMENT?**

(Continued from page 5) posed a free republic of Negroes in the land which should be owned and governed by Negroes—Africa. Some day his ideal will be accepted and it will materialize Some day Negro Africa will be free Africa, and it will not be divided between France and Great Britain.
"Garvey's troubles began when

he stepped on the toes of these nations. They saw in him a danger ous sgitator who would cause trouble and lead the people of his own color in Africa to think for themselves. And so hireling journalists, acting at the bidding their foreign masters, painted Garvery as a joke and trickster. Had the man been given half a fair deal his financial schemes might have been successful and he might have been able to avoid the unfortunate disasters which led him into the courts and brought punishment

upon him. The Buffalo Evening Times, another white newspaper, under date of Feb-ruary 24, 1925, points out another phase of public opinion bearing on the case

'Justice Open to Question" "It is a very grave question whether justice has been done in the case of Marcus Garvey, selfstyled President of the African Refacilitate the emigration of colored people as colonists for the foundation of a republic, populated by them and under their control, in

the land of their forefathers. "He had become the idel of the colored race. Other leaders were in the discard. White hostility was aroused lest he inspire his own people over intensively with race consciousness. Without going too deeply into the merits or demerits of the case, many elements extra-neous to his business enterprises seem to have played an atmospheric part in his trial and con-viction. He was permitted to plead his own case, a circumstance that put him at tremendous disadvan-tage as against a trained prosecutor in a Federal Court. . .

"If, for the sake of argument, every contention of the authorities be granted, there is still something that is not pleasant about this whole business. Intent is the essence of a crime. This man's entire proceedings have a certain consistency with the possible assumption of great dreams and vis-ions for his race. It is conceivable, on the supposition of his entire sincerity, that everybody else might regard his plans as chimerical, and it is likewise natural to expect that such a man, with even the best of motives, might make mistakes—innocentises that—such as would bring him within the network of watchful prosecution. What we regretfully point out, in the consideration of comparative justice is the fact that this colored man is given a sentence of years when so many greater offenders are sentenced to but two years, and still others are enjoying complete immunity from any punishment whatsoever."

Harris Grows Penitent

Garvey is in prison, 'tis true, but has he really "gone"? No, the most vicious of his enemies will admit that Garveyism goes merrily marching on. Let us quote Mr. George Harris, for one of the immortal eight who signed the famous letter to Mr Daugherty. Under date of January 28, 1926, in the N. Y. News, he states;
"By his conviction and imprisonment he has focussed in

en a wider circle, the minds of the black millions throughout the world, not only upon himself, but upon his propaganda. The story is given wide credence that Garvey was wrongfully convicted that, had he not been his own lawyer that he would have been freed, that had the English government been behind his prosecution that he would never have been sentenced to Atlanta. Be that as it may in this recurrence of the problem, 'what to do with Garvey,' it is in point for us to sosin sav that the white world must reckon with his radical demands, that it no longer seek to harness and ex-ploit the black people of the world."

Pickens and His Pen

And here we have another member of the Committee of Eight Good Darkies, in the person of William Pickens, piously saying a word in defense of Garvey. Shades of DuBois and his famous edict, what has hap-pened in the N. A. C. P. Camp? But let us not digress. Mr. Pickens writes in an article to the Amsterdam News on the 13th day of this month

"Garvey was not at heart a criminal. He did not set out to steal or cheat it is our belief. But, knowingly or unknowingly, he ran afoul of technical law by selling or permitting to be sold, stock in a concern that was bankrupt. Not because he expected to cheat anybody out of just so much money, but because Garvey is a visionary, a bold dreamer, who thought he could resuscitate a pration which was dead, but dead, but just kayoed for the time being . . . Garvey who helped to jail himself by being braver than the others, but less shrewd than the others, during the trial, can now be released not only without any social hurt, but even with social justice."

This is from the pen of the same William Pickens, whom we saw enter the court room one morning (when all assembled were waiting for his honor the judge to arrive) and shake the hands of the prosecuting attorney and nat him on the shoulder. This act created much comment, as it occurred after the prosecuting attorney had made his summation to the jury, and the morning before the judge had charged the jury. Everyone agreed that Mr. Pickens was rather indiscreet to have chosen the court room as fitting place to fraternize with the prosecuting attorney and offer congratulations; but strange are the acts

of Mr. Pickens, whom we know well, as he used to call very often on Mr. Garvey at his apartment. Let us hasten to a close, however, and leave Mr. Pickens to ponder over his indiscreet and contradictory acts.

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
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
