B. W. I., Witnesses The Greatest Event In Its History - 25,-000 March in Parade on Opening of Sixth International Convention

Delegates Attend From All Over The World—Various Negro Organizations Present

KINGSTON, JAMAICA, B. W. I. Thursday, August 1st, 1929—Nearly every Negro Organization on earth was represented in the great parade which marked the opening of the Sixth International Convention of the Mary Puples of the World here to-day, as imore than 25,000 persons, forming a procession nearly five miles long swung through the streets of this city, attended by several bands of music, playing Negro hymns and carrying the colors of the red, black and green, the standard of the Universal Negro Improvement Associa-tion, led by its beloved President, General, the Hon. Marcus Garvey.

China Invincible, Says ex-Kaiser-He Assails

Russia

Asserting that China cannot be conquered, former Kaiser Wilhelm from his retirement in a Dutch castle at Doorn, issued an appeal in behalf of China. He says that the attempt to Bolshevise China is the last trump card of the Soviets—for China is unconquerable. He states: "It is doubtful whether the Soviets could survive a debacle in Asia. At heart the Japanese sympathics with the Chinese in their struggle for national independence. Asia for the Asiatics is a slogan that inflames Chinese and panese slike." He said: "China has a right to be free. Nothing can stop the rebirth of China as a nation." (Take notice.)





Wage increases are general except in the South Atlantic States where some decrease is shown. The sup-ply of farm labor is reported as 101.7 cent of demand as compared with 105.5 per cent a year ago.

Albany, June 28.-The attention of distributors under the gasoline tax law has been called for the last time to the fact that they must be regis tered with the state by Monday Thomas M. Lynch, Commissioner of Taxation and Finance and President of the State Tax Commission has issued a number of statements to this effect urging all distributors to register as required by law. The gaso-line tax law has been in effect since May 1, but all distributors were given 60 days or to the last of June to register. Distributors under this law are persons, organizations, firms or corporations who import or cause to be imported to this state motor fuel and also persons who manufacture, compound, refine or produce motor fuel in this state.
