### In Non-Technical Language the Construction.of the Eye is Explained-Causes of Near and Far Sightedness-General Rules Suggested

In Advanced Years "As we advance in age the lens of the eye gradually hardens, making it difficult to focus properly. This hardening process is termed presbyopia. It is entirely normal About the age of forty most per-sons find that it is difficult to see print clearly. The hardening of the lens, normal to their age, has begun to interfere with their focussing power. A visit to an oculist must at once be paid and eyeglasses be fitted to remedy this condition. As the years pass this process increases until at about he age of sixty the lens is completely hardened. Therefore every few years it is necessary to increase the strength of the glasses. Regular visits to the oculist should be part of the health program of

General Rules

"in caring for our eves we must use common sense. If we are forced to do close eye-work for long periods we should rest our eves at intervals by raising the from our work and looking into the distance. The eve is built for distant focussing. It is at rest about twenty feet. Close work when it focusses at a distance of reans tension of the muscles. The tension of close work, therefore can be valieved by an occasional glance across the room or out o the window.

When we read we should make sure that the light is adequate. neither too dim, nor so bright that t casts a dazzling reflection on the page. Artificial lights should be sufficiently bright and yet wellshaded to protect the eyes from the glare. Daylight is the best illumination. But windows should


