CHICKASHA, Okla., May 31.-Lynch law today exacted the life of Henry Argo, nineteen-year-old Negro charged with attacking a white woman—the second member of his race to die at the hands of a mob in the Southwest within a month.

Zoologist Traces Ancestors of The

PEIPING, May 25.-Roy Chapman logist, announced today that he would start tomorrow on his latest expedition into Monogolia in search of the birthplace of man.

The explorers of the American Museum of Natural History plan to cover within the five months an area of 4,000 miles in the Gobi Desert. They will work eastward to a district never mapped, about halfway from Kalgan to the Russian frontier. Trace of the ancestors of the mil-

lion-year-old "Peking woman," will be the immediate objective of Andrews. The area on which he will concentrate is a great strip of the earth's pliocene stratum. Preceding the ice age, which scientists believe was the age of the "Peking woman," whose skull was discovered near Pelping last

WASHINGTON, D. "I'll not object to adjournment, your honor," said the counsel for the Negro World, "but I move that the de-fendant's bail should be increased in view of the fact that he carried a big gun apparently with the inten-tion of manslaughter and in view of the fact that he is not a resident of the city of New York. The judge agreed with the counsel-for the Negro World. "I personally would require a much higher bail in such a case," said his honor, "but I hesitate to increase it now in deference to Judge McQuade, who fixed the bail originally.

In the meanwhile Mr. Knox's counsel offered to produce his client on his own responsibility whenever required. The judge said that was suf-ficient guarantee since ball is required only to insure the appearance of the defendant.

Poet in England Says Britain Rale There Without Euman Sympothy —Expects Change

(Special Cable to New York Times) LONDON, May 21.—The present conflict in India is a struggle b man and machine in the opinion of Rabindranath Tagore, Indian post and mystic, who is now in England.

Mr. Tagore, who has many friends here and who has been knighted by the King, has harsh things to say of the spirit of the British administration of India. He is sympathetic to Mahatma Gandhi's campaign and believes the eventual triumph of the Nationalists is certain.

"India is being ruled by a com plicated machine, 'the aged poet said in speaking today at the yearly meeting of the Society of Friends. "The mechanics who drive it have had long training in power, which is superfluous in a workshop. A check of casualities in three days of rioting this week revealed a total of eighty-six dead and close to 1,000 injured.


