CAPE TOWN, South Africa .--- A reception was given to the Worcester prisoners by the Cape Town branch of the African National Congress in the Banqueting Hall, on July 3'. The prisoners were released from Worcester gaol the previous week on bail of £25 each. Elliot Tonjeni, who had just returned from a tour of the country districts, was also present. Many people were unable to attend

the reception on account of the ridi-culously high price of admission (2s. 6d.), but quite a good crowd furned up and gave the fighters a rousing welcome. "Swart Man Gaan Afriga Regeer"

The chairman of the Worcester meeting, J. Oosthuisen, received a tremendous ovation when he rose to speak. Speaking in Afrikaans, he described the frightful conditions pre-vailing in the countryside, where agricultural laborers often have to work from 3 a. m. to 9 p. m. on the farms of the white land owners. The speaker said that those who remained outside the organization helped to perpetuate these conditions. Theu salvation lay in their own hands. FELLOWMEN OF THE NEGRO RACE, Greeting:

It was with deep regret we read a few weeks ago of the sad happening of the closing of the Binga State Bank of Chicago. We hope by now Mr. Binga has been able to re-open his banking institution. (It is stated that Binga Bank may soon reopen.-Editor.) . As related, the Binga Bank is one of the oldest Banks among the colored people in America. Mr. Binga, up to recently, was rated as a rich man. The collapse comes as a startling surprise to those who have watched with admiration the growth of the American Negro in big

Those of us who have studiously and keenly studied the attitude of the white man toward the Negro have always been afraid that me of our business men misunderstood the attitude of the white man in America toward the Negro. We have always stated and have always explained that the white man ir America means no good to the Negro commercially, industrially and po-litically except to use the Negro to suit his own selfishness. # **Cuban Officials** Slight, Harass **Race Notables**

Took Hint from U.S. Government to Discourage Negroes' Entry

HAVANA, Cuba,- Mrs. Mary Mc Leod Bethune, famous woman leader of the United States, and President R. P. Sims of Bluefield Institute, with members of their families, were held back and annoyed when they were to embark at Havana.

The Cuban officials later claimed that they acted under suggested wishes of the United States govern-ment officials in harassing and discouraging Negroes from coming into Cuba. Strangely enough, this annoy-ance and barassing does not discriminate between those who go seek ing work, as some from Jamaica, and those traveling as tourists and edu-cators, like Dr. Sims and his daugh-ter and Mrs. Bethane and her grandson, who came as a party from Florida.

### "It is Americans"

President Sims and his daughter. being lighter of skin, were about to be passed by the official, while Mrs. Bethune, being plainly Negro, was being held up. # Chief Justice in Sensational Litigation Modified

KINGSTON Jamaica, B. W. I.-Another episode in the long and com-plicated series of litigations involving principally the unincorporated and incorporated bodies called the Universal Negro Improvement Association, and arising from the action of G. C .-- According to the advices to the League of Nations made public by the State Department this week, the government of Abyssinia has practically eliminated the slave traffic which has been carried on by bandits in the country. Dating back to ancient times, slave raffic has been carried on in the country by bandits, but now their activities have been eradicated by patrols, and the practice exists only in remote and inaccessible parts of the large country



The Abyssinians, who were constantly at war, increased the number of their prisoners and con-sequently the number of their slaves. Accordingly, there gradually grew

up a caste of slaves which became very numerous. Such slavery, moreover, was in conformity with the precepts of Hebrew law, with which the Abyssinians were imbued and which formed the basis of their re-

arge numbers of slaves were solicited by slave traders- mainly Arabs, who supplied the foreign markets--to part with some of their slaves in exchange for money or merchandise, and many allowed themselves to be tempted by the magnificent offers they received Gradually this became a lugrative trade and finally, when the demand for slaves exceeded the supply, the (Continued on Page Light)







# The Nobel Peace Prizes

T is reported in the Press that there have been quite a few candidates t the Nobel Peace Prize this year. Among them Mr. Frank P. Kellogg. the former United States Secretary of State and Miss Jane Addams, the founder of the famous Hull House in Chicago are prominently mentioned. No peace prizes have been awarded since 1927, for the simple

reason that no solid effort was made to establish peace. The last award was made to the late Dr. Gustav Stresemann, the then Foreign minister of Germany and to M. Aristide Briand, the present Foreign Minister of France jointly for the Locarno Treaties, a patch work toward a political

peace. "Political Peace" sums up all the awards made hitherto by the Nobel Peace Foundation at Oslo. In the international whirlpool only the strongest power can bring pressure to bear. And whoever brings that pressure effectively is in a position to effect a truce in any conflict. And such a truce-maker has been hailed up till now as a great worker for world

. Theodore Roosevelt was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for effect ing peace between Japan and Russia. And Woodrow Wilson received that award for the Versailles Treaty, that veritable travesty on justice and peace. In fact, the Nobel Peace Prize Committee has made a had mes out of that award. It has always sought a melodramatic political figure for its laurels, without taking a long range view of the work of those men in establishing true peace.

Humanitarians had put forward the candidacy of Mahatma Gandhi of India, we beileve it was in 1923, as the greatest worker for true peace. From the reports current then the committee of award seems to have refused the award on the narrowest margin. The slight majority believed that it was not wise to affront the greatest of world powers, Great Britain, against whom Gandhi has been waging relentless war.

It seems to us that all efforts that do not aim at true peace fail to bring about an enduring world peace. What do we mean by TRUE r PEACE? We mean thereby that all the causes that give rise to oppression,

The white employer, perhaps justifiably, considering from the stand pint of our philosophy, is discharging the Negro workers mercilessly t nake room for the starving whites. But imagine we had a number of mportant Negro industrial enterprises where there were employed also ome whites. What would happen in times like these? If the white mployers began to fire Negro workers the Negro employers would also be firing the white workers. Tit for tat, hey! But no. There would have been an equilibrium, and no such crisis as the present one would have ver arisen.

The Negro could go still further. If he keeps on meeting di minations on the part of the whites he could establish relations with s brother Negroes in the West Indies, Africa and Central and South merica. Consider the vast natural resources and labor power at the mmand of the Negro race if it ever makes up its mind to exploit i on inherent possibilities. It would be a wonder race!

But hitherto the short-sighted men were blocking the working philosophy, which is nothing but the philosophy of the Universal Negro Improvement Association. Now things have changed. The te ific economic pressure that the Negroes in the United States are a resent suffering under will force them to reconsider the teachings of Marcus Garvey, and we have no doubt that they are now secretly regre g their folly in foiling the enterprises of the U. N. I. A.

But success can only be built up upon failure. And what is failure another step toward success? In this assurance let us go forwarnd remake our fortunes.
