NEGRO RACE Greetings:

For the careful and impartial mind surveying the Negro in his conduct of relationship to his own, to give an opinion on the impression gained is probably to create alarm. Thus, looking at the Negro, we are disposed to give expression to a few of the things that we believe he is practicing, very harmful and detri-mental to his own good and wel-

We can think of nothing more pointed in this direction than the conduct of Negroes in organiza-Sometimes we wonder why it is Negro movements never succeed permanently and why the glorious objects of movements are never fully realized in a lifetime. The Negro Doesn't Stick

The answer is, that the average Negro sticks to nothing long enough to make a success of it. If he joins an organization with the clamor of those who become attached to it, after a couple of years in the association that particular member is either ready to disturb the peaceful working of that or-ganization or he finds it to his convenience to draw himself and as many as he can appeal to, away from such an organization to form one of his own, and so the co-operative strength that should go to make the first organization succeed is divided up among dozens and la-ter hundreds of similar organizations, each too weak to do any good for its community or the race, and none willing to sink its individuality into a greater movement that would

do good for one and all. Such has been the history of our churches and our different organizations and movements out of which have sprung so many branches and divisions, simply because the Negro has not yet learnt the true spirit of cooperation.

Individual Conduct

What is true of the individual's conduct in organization, is also true of the individual's conduct to other individuals of the race. There is ing is called. never a true and honest disposition to cooperate but ever the readiness and willingness to pull away from and be separate and distinct in everything to be done. According to a St. Louis paper: "The story of Dred Scott has become almost a legend. Exactly 100 years ago, Dred Scott was brought to St. Louis as a slave from Virginia. he was taken to the free state of Illi-nois and later to the free territory of Minnesota. He was brought back to Those of us who love the present St. Louis in 1838 by his master. Scott

> Dred, on his return to St. Louis, claimed that his sojourn in a free The decision was in his favor. But later the case was transferred to the United States district court and later taken up before the U.S. Supreme Court in Washington, D. C. With the slavery question flaming over the na-tion, this case attracted nation-wide attention. A decision was handed down declaring Dred a slave in 1857 and immediately the North broke into protest. Lincoln denounced the decision as one of the events that has

White Merchants Score Curfew Against Negroes

MIAMI, Fla.—Reports that city police have been too zealous in enforcing Miami's curfew law against Negroes along North Miami avenue, was being investigated today by Director S. D. McCreary, of the department of public safety.

The investigation follows com-plaints of North Miami avenue merchants that their customers are falling off since the curfew was put into effect last week.

Mr. McCreary's order was to the effect that Negroes must keep out of the white sections of the city after 8 p. m. unless they have a legitimate excuse, and that officers are to ascertain whether they have a good excuse and pick them up if they are found loitering.

It is the purpose of the order to

cut down law violations in both the white and Negro sections of the city by keeping the races sep-arate, thus making it easier to apprehend an offender.

Meat and Fowl Vanish on **Tables Until Butchers** Surrender

WARNING TO BAKERS

800 Women Campaign for Just 5 Weeks; Reductions Follow

Eight hundred militant housewives of Middle Village, Queens, having banded together to force seven butchers and two poultry dealers into reductions in the price of meats and chicken, sent the three leading bakers of the community shivering into their hops yesterday with a demand for cheaper bread and rolls.

Triumphant in their crusade for cheaper meat and poultry, and stili hale and hearty after a five weeks' diet of vegetables and fish, the wo-men pointed to the reported wheat surpluses with such undeniable insistence that one baker capitulated within twenty-four hours and did a handsome business at the dinner hour last night, while his two colleagues

stood by in comparative idleness.

Goodman started the drive for cheaper foodstuffs, canvassing the homes of Middle Village and calling attention to the law of supply and demand with economic eloquence that enlisted followers quickly.

The bakers agreed to announce their decision last night, but at a late hour only the Morton Avenue Bakery had agreed to a comprmise. Rolls were cut from 24 to 17 cents a loaf, although the women wanted the rolls for 15 cents a dozen and the bread for 6 cents a pound. The prices of twist loaves fell from 25 to 22 cents, 15 to 13 cents and 10 to 7 cents.





There will also be state, district and county organiza-tions. In fact, Mr. Johnson stated, 'It is our plan to make our organization just as thorough as that any other political organization. It is our aim to reach the individual voter and take part in every election held

How to Display America's Flag

There are only two ways to display he American flag properly.

One is to fly the flag from a staff, either lengthwise or breadthwise, with the Union always uppermose and to the observer's left as he faces the

Attempts to "improve" the appearance of the American flag by other methods of display, such as fastening it into a rosette or using it as a draping, lack the respect due Old Glory as symbol of our country.

To fly the flag from a staff, hoist it briskly to the peak, with the Union uppermost. It should be lowered slowly and ceremoniously, never per-mitting the folds to touch the ground. If suspended across a street, the

flag should be hung vertically, with the Union uppermost and to the north in an east-and-west street and to the east in a north-and-south street. When flown at halfstaff, the flag should be raised to the peak of the staff and then lowered to half staff; before lowering for the day, it should be raised again to the peak and

owered for removal. At crossed staff with another flag, the American flag should be on the observer's left, the staff in front of the staff of the other flag.

When forming a cluster with other flags, the American flag should be in

the center of the group or at the highest point in the group.

In a procession, the American flag should be on the marching right of all other flags, or in the forecenter of line of flags.

Whether indoors or out, the flag should not be festooned over doorways or arches tied in a bow-knot or otherwise employed in a purely decorative manner. For these purposes, bunting of the national colors is more appropriate and since the blue Union is the flag's highest point,

On a speaker's platform, the Ameri can flag, if not flown from a star should be displayed flat and placed above and to the rear of the speaker—Union on the observer's left. If on a staff, the flag should be on the

On a staff projecting from a winangle, with the Union, except when at half staff, to the outermost point of the staff.

When several flags are flown from staffs, the American flag should be flown from the staff on the extreme left of the observer. Old Glory is oisted first and lowered last.

Armed with experience in wiping out yellow fever in the American tropics, medical men have outwitted yellow-fever-carrying insects in Western Africa, according to recent reports from Lagos, Nigeria.

"Lagos, capital of British Nigeria is an example of the change in West-ern Africa that has brought health to a once disease-ridden region," says bulletin of the National Geographic Society.

DRY DRIVE IN ETHIOPIA

WASHINGTON .- A campaign for prohibition by Haile Selassie I, Emperor of Eethiopia, was described to-day by the State Department, which made public an article picturing "The Harm of Drink Shops" that appeared recently in the Berhanena Salam, a emi-official Ethiopian newspaper published from the private printing-press of the Emperor.

The article was sent to the depart-

ment by Addison E. Southard, the American Minister at Addis Ababa. The department explained that it was not indulging in propaganda on either side of the wet and dry issue in this country, but believed that the article made interesting reading.

The report centered around the use of tej, the national home brew of Ethiophia, a potent and reasonably cheap drink that is widely used. Translated, the article in part

"Proprietors of lands alongside the oads build two or three or shops. The greater number of these places are operated as drink shops. The operators of these shops invite musicians. Passers-by are attracted by the sweetness of the music. Some young men approach the shops and listen. When they see the tej nicely presented in a row of decanters they say: 'Let us buy a piaster's worth and taste it.'

"Attracted and amused by the conversation, they tarry and decide to drink some more. The musicians request them to give their names. The musicians begin to praise them by which our boys fought and died on scores of battlefields. Were Henry Ward Beecher, Harriett Beecher Stowe, Charles Sumner, John Brown or the immortal Theodore Rooserians, also.

"It cannot be questioned that if they had their masters' money they would give it also without measure Or else they go after having pawned their arms or cartridge belts.
