EVICTIONS HELD UP

By Order of Mayor; Negro Leaders and Officials Confer

CHICAGO.—In a clash on the South Side this afternoon between police and about 5,000 Negroes led Communists, three Negro men were shot and killed, a number of others were seriously wounded and three patrolmen were injured. The trouble started over the eviction of a woman from a flat. Two court bailiffs, carrying the eviction

order, moved her furniture to the street. There it was left, with po liceman guarding it. Rumors that Communists were gathering a crowd near by brought a squad of five patrolmen to the scene. When they arrived about 100

of the Communist-led mob were al

ready on hand. The mob advanced with shouts o "Put that furniture back" and "Wo want something to eat." Then some of them began to carry the furniture back into the flat. At this point de-tectives seized three men whom they believed to be ringleaders and sent

Shot 32 Times by Mob; Accused of Accosting White Girl; Body Chained to Tree

HAYNESVILLE, Ala .-- A 16-year old Negro boy, accused of an at-tempted attack on an 11-year-old white girl, was lynched by a posse n the Sandy Ridge community today. The Negro was shot 32 times, Sherif W. E. Meadows reported.

The sheriff said the Negro had ac costed the girl this morning as she was walking to a grocery store. She escaped and ran to her home. When the sheriff arrived he found the Negro's body tied to a tree with a rope and dog chain. No arrests have been

Colored Harlem is now in a mood of self-assertion. It is extremely conscious of its growing numbers and

Just as Eugene McIntosh of the Harlem Progressive Democratic Association is out to oust the leadership in the 21st A. D., of Thomas F. Murray, white, and the Tammany-controlled and Tammany-nominated boss, Ferdinand Q. Morton, so also John R. McNeel of the John R. Mc-Neel Association, has started a de-termined campaign to wrest the leadership from Martin E. Healy, white, who has been the leader in the 19th A. D. for the last ten years.

The 19th A. D. is now more than 85 per cent colored, Mr. McNeel explained. Yet the district is ruled by and in the interest of a 15 per cent minority. The white leadership is maintained through the grace of the colored, for nearly 70 per cent of the enrolled Democrats are col-ored. And yet all the plums and pudding go to the white followers of the white leaders.

"Take for instance, the question of patronage," continued Mr. McNeel. "There is nearly half a million dol-lars' worth of patronage at the command of the leader. And Mr. Healy has made it a practice throughout his regime to distribute 99 per cent of this patronage to the whites who constitute only 15 per cent in the district, whereas the 85 per cent of the Negroes get only 1 per cent.

"A leader of a district has a mor-al obligation to look after the welfare of the people of his district. As everybody knows, the Negro is hard pressed when it comes to get a decent employment. 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





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Helpful Hints on Infantile Paralysis

gives out the following hints to the public on infantile paralysis:

While I urge parents to take all the precautions I outline below, I suggest that they do not lose their sense of proportion, and be come panicky.

Infantile Paralysis is caused by an invisible germ present in the nose and throat of the patients and of persons germ reaches the brain and spinal cord, destroying the nerve cells and thus producing paralysis of muscles in various parts of the body. Early

Symptom

The early symptoms are usually fever, headaches, fretfulness, or irritability, drowsiness, weakness, vom-iting, and sometimes diarrhoea. There may or may not be acute pain at this time. Later there is pain in the neck, back, arms or legs, with great weakness. If paralysis is to occur, it usually appears from the second to the fifth day after the sickness begins. Some cases do not go on to paralysis, or the paralysis

may be so mild as to escape notice. Since the germ of the disease is present in discharges from the nose and throat of those ill with infantile paralysis, do not let your children play with those who have just been sick, or who have recently had socalled "colds" or "summer com olaint."

In such cases an examination of the spinal fluid withdrawn by means of a spinal puncture will establish the diagnosis. Early diagnosis is extremely imthere is any paralysis. At this stage treatment with serum of those who have had the disease appears to be of value. Under the circumstances, therefore, parents should not delay calling a physician if any of their children are not well. In poliomyelitis delay is especially dangerous. Why Crowds Should

Avoided Studies of the past ten years indicate that the germ of poliomyelitis is widespread. In fact, it seems likely that 90 per cent of those liv ing in large cities have been so much exposed to the germ that their bodies have built up a specific protection against its invasion. There is no simple method of detecting the gern in the nose and throat of those harboring it. In times like the present therefore, it is wise to keep children out of all crowds, have them play as much as possible among hemselves, and under supervision They should, of course, be kept away from all who are sick, no matter what the nature of the disease.

In child caring institutions ing of the children should be pro-hibited; in all such institutions under the jurisdiction of the Departnent of Health, instructions to this effect have been issued. As 300n as case of suspicious illness develops, the patient should at once be iso lated and a physician called.

So far as is known, the disease is by vermin or other insects. Nevertheless, it is always a safe rule in all communicable diseases to pay special attention to cleanliness.

The work is under the supervision of Miss Charlotte Hunter, retired, for more than 35 years a teacher in the local public schools. She is a member of the American Blind Association and executive secretary of the Associa-tion of Aid to Colored Blind. She is also a federal teacher of the blind and is instrumental in the opening of

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Haiti Wins Control Of Civil Services

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti. - The first important step leading toward the withdrawal of the American occupation of Haiti occurred at noon today when Dr. Dana G. Munro American Minister, and Abel Leger Haitian Foreign Minister, signed an agreement transferring the treaty departments of the Haitian government, now operated by Americans, to Hai

The transfer is to become effective October 1, at the beginning of the fiscal year.

The departments affected, accord ing to a statement by the American Minister, are the Department of Pubwhich are American civilians, and the Public Health Service, in which are officers and enlisted men of the Medical Department of the United States Navv.

The sanitary mission will remain on duty in Port au Prince, Cape Haitlen and Petitionville, the mission to consist of three American medical officers nominated by the United States government and appointed by the President of Haiti, and not to exceed six navy hospital corps men. All other Americans in the Treaty Department are to be withdrawn by September 30.

The agreement provides for the abrogation of the accord of August 24, 1918, which obligated the government of Haiti to communicate all proposed laws bearing upon objects of the treaty of 1915 to the representative of the United States presenting them to the Legislature and also the accord of December 3, It was stated at the offices of 1918, requiring the visa of the Finan on orders of payment
