Mme. A'Lelia Walker, heiress to Mme. C. J. Walker, beauty products millions, "First Lady" of New York's exclusive society circles, and reputed to be the wealthiest colored woman in the country, is dead

One thing well known to have secured in the instructor's removal was his action in taking a class of sociology students on a visit to Wilberforce University, where white girls danced with Wilberforce students at a social affair. Is Termed Bad Faith

The report of the investigating committee asserted that the action of the trustees was a grave violation of "every essential safeguard" in preserving freedom of speech and the security of the American professor tenure of position. The attitude of the board of trustees, declares the committee, is in this case "directly opposed to sound public policy, good educational practice and long stablished university ideals."

Examining the "Bombay incident," in which Professor Miller was alleged in a public statement of the trustees to have "incited the Hindus to civil disobedience," the report says that his brief remarks were "a proper expression of opinion from an authority in Dr. Miller's field and that it (the speech) aroused no objection with respect to its propriety in any responsible quarter other than the board of trustees of Ohio State University."

As to complaints which the board declares it has received for several years against Dr. Miller's alleged radicalism on social and racial questions, the investigators said they were unable to discover any evidence of such dissatisfaction. On the contrary. Dr. Miller was said to have been moderate and well-balanced.

The shack is owned and operated by Negroes, but has a large white patronage. Mrs. "Tiny" Holder, pro-prietor, explained Saturday night that a white man from Alabama had come in with a party of ten persons and had refused to spend any money as long as some Negro couples from another table were using the floor. Mrs. Holder said the situation grew tense as the southerner violently objected to the presence of the Negroes. In order to keep her trade, Mrs. Holder asked the Negroes to leave the

The town of West Southern Pines was chartered on July 9, 1923, by the state general assembly as a muni-cipality. The people of the town then elected their own Mayor, commissioners, constables, law enforcement of-ficers, welfare heads, sanitary committee, and established a tax rate of 50 cents per \$100. Under their guidance splendid success was met, and the Negroes built beautiful homes, churches, business buildings, and one of the finest school buildings in the tate of North Carolina, through private charity and the Negro citizens

A rather unusual fact about this town is that very few of its Negro citizens possess more than a formal education. The money value of the municipality, however, runs into many thousands.

The action of the General Assembly, however, changes the situation, and throws the citizens of West Southern Pines against the prospec of having to pay a new tax rate of \$2.15 per \$100, which is the rate in Southern Pines. West Southern Pines consists of a tract of land coverin over 50 acres, with over 200 homes
