WASHINGTON .- Coincident with a shifting of units of Negro organiza-tions in the army because of abandonment of obsolete posts, the force of about 4,000 Negro troops is to be reduced by about 500 through stoppage of enlistments to obtain this Last night peace reigned again in year's increment of 1,200 men out of Harlem and all of the disgruntled ground forces for the Army Air

> A wide spread Negro protest has been lodged with President Hoover Mr. De Priest made a special trip from Chicago two days ago to lodge his protest with Mr. Hoover person-ally. He told the President that the colored people thought the War De partment was discriminating against the Negro troops.

The charge that they will be used primarily for menial jobs was denied. It was also pointed out that other army units composed of white soldiers have been divided among several camps without protest.

Quaker City Bars Film, "Hospital Supt. Says Negro "The Birth of Nation" Workers Are Incompetent

Opposition to Talk Almost
Bars His Appearance

MOBILE, Ala,—Despite the opposition of the Lions and Kiwanis clubs and several groups of Negroes, Congressman Oscar DePriest spoke Friday night to a good sized audience.

A. Mackey today ordered "The Birth of a Nation," filmed by David Wark Griffith seventeen years ago, barred from the screen here. Mackey decided the picture was "prejudicial to peace between the black and white races," and announced that if the picture were shown here he would have the theatre raided.






