Then he told us of the Firestone rubber case in Liberia. He said that the Natives are not as dumb as others thought them to be. The contractor wanted them to take the rubber crests out of the ground, to dig them two feet below surface. They can't sell to another company, your plantation. If you can't handle it, leave it here. 50 thousand acres are now plantations in rubber, and the price was \$1.50 per lb. and something happened that it went down to 16c but instead of the officials accepting their word, they said to them we don't want you to lose on your rubber, while it is low on the market, we will buy it for 16c.

so just stack it up here in Liberia until the price goes up. Those countries that now have a possession in Africa, got it by surveying land and claiming taxes, they didn't buy a foot of it. When we landed we were royally treated by Government officials. They said to us we welcome

you home, when you return please tell our brothers in America we have our mind now and we govern our own country. Tell Garvey to come to Liberia. We need him there. All of you, come HOME.
