A Non-Partisan Registration League Formed by B'klynites

Ask those who attended the political conference of the two major parties on Thursday evening, October 1, at the Holy Trinity Baptist Church, DeKalb avenue, near Franklin, Rev. T. S. Harten, pastor. The like was never witnessed before in the history of politics as recalled by the oldest politician present. Both colored Republicans and Democrats vied for the meeting was one of the friendliest and most cordial.

The meeting was called by the Rev. T. S. Harten, pastor of Holy Trinity Baptist Church, president of the National Afro Protective League and the national vice-president of the national convention of the U. S. A., Inc., who was master of ceremonies and delivered the opening address.

Dr. Harten stated the object of the call and said the meeting was for the purpose of discussing the merits or demerits of any party, nor was it for the purpose of electing any party for political leadership, as he has been so often asked to do.

Dr. Harten stated more than once during the meeting that some time ago he offered the colored Republicans and the leadership of the colored Democrats and refused both. He stated that he would like to see the leadership of the party offered to him on a golden platter studded with diamonds, and he would like to see Christ let it be his God-called duty to work for the betterment of his race politically and economically as well as spiritually.

The further stated that it was high time and essential that the Negro preacher, who is supported by the members of his race, strive to bring about economic freedom as well as political freedom for his race. He stated that he would like to see the Negro people rise up and take the lead in the race ahead of party, and laid emphasis on how the Negroes would take each other apart in the race war over. He recalled an incident of how they had even gone out of the Negro people in the past.

He stated another incident of just a little less than a year ago, the night before election in the city of New York, when the Negroes were being driven out of the city by the white people.
