GARVEY RELIGINGS IN FIRING LINE to resurrect spirit of universal negro improvement association with new ideas, with new visions; to rescue race from wilderness

NEW YORK, DECEMBER 19, 1931

Satisfied Opponents Have No Plans, No Courage to Help the Negroes of America Nor of the World

Kingston, Jamaica.

Fellowmen of the Negro Race, Greeting:

It is quite a while since I have sent you the characteristic message of foresight and leadership in the great cause Afric. This was due to the fact that for the last four years I have been studying seriously the reaction on our world economic and political situations.

National and International Leadership

Due to the attitude of certain other leaders toward me, in doing their worst to have me deported from the United States of America, I purposely refrained from projecting myself upon the world situation, and particularly the American situation, so as to give my detractors the opportunity to rise to the occasion of national and international leadership, which they made every effort to deprive me of.

My observations and conclusions are that they have hopelessly failed. We can find no competent leader anywhere, who is able to present a solution to the grave problems that confront us.

Wandering in Wilderness

Without any criticisms of Messrs. Dubois, Pickens, Weldon Johnson, Chandler Owen and all the rest who signed the petition to have me deported from America, I find that they are no better at this moment than the leaderless people, because they have no program and they are wandering in the wilderness just like the multitude.

Returns to Firing Line

For the time being, I want to assure all my friends, particularly in the United States and Central and South America that I have returned once more to the firing line. I have just, with the assistance of my friends, returned from my trip to England, France, Switzerland-particularly to Geneva, where J had the wonderful opportunity of again bringing forward the Petition to the League of Nations, which is now being seriously considered, being a part of the Agenda of the League for discussion, whenever we ourselves desire to bring it forward in the Assembly. My visit to Geneva was productive of great results; my stay in England also was refreshing and supplied me with new ideas of racial usefulness, that shall be brought to play in the great drama that is now to be enacted in bringing the Negro forward to take his place in the new reorganization of the world. My friends, the time has come for united action; united Negro America and the Negro West Indies and South and Central America and Africa must be the keynote.

Time Ripe to Give Race National and International Leadership Under the Red, Black and Green

so that our substance and effort may not be wasted in lending assistance to vagabonds and rogues in the name of liberty, rather than giving that support to the cause that needs assistance.

Follow and Support

Let us not be discouraged even in the midst of this world economic stagnation. With leadership we can profit therefrom. We promise that leadership, and sincerely we ask the millions to follow and support us.

Warning to Public

We advise that we are associated with no scheme other than that which appears above the signature of the President-General of the Universal Negro Improvement Association. Efforts have been made in the past to deceive the public with all kinds of extraneous schemes and designs and the people, after being deceived, have been writing to us, asking if we knew about this or that. To make a long story short, we are identified with no scheme of any sort except that which appears above the official signature of the leader of the Universal Negro Improvement Association. If all the people will follow these instructions there will be no need for dissatisfaction and all of us will work in the one great and common cause for the establishment of our race and the redemption of our common country, Africa.

A Ten Year Plan

Destructive Elements Among Negroes

My writing at this time is not to develop any criticism against my enemies, nor even to censure them in their ignorance. What they have done in endeavoring to destroy me and the Black Star Line, that today would have been one of the great shipping institutions of the world and all the allied enterprises started that would have made it possible for the Negro to be economically free at this time, will pass by for what it is worth. I only draw this to the attention of the world of Negroes to show how maliciously wicked as a people we are to ourselves.

The Vision of Today

When we started the great enterprises 10 years ago, we had before us the vision of today. Our critics then had no vision and because of that the people must now perish. How can I see millions of my own perish because of lack of vision? Since I cannot do this, I have again to step forward to present a program that is to be the solution of the grave situation in which we now find ourselves. This program will

A Resurrected Spirit

The Universal Negro Improvement Association is going to resurrect this spirit as it has never done before. It is going to be done in that sober, calm and deliberate consciousness and leadership that shall leave nothing to be desired in reaching the ultimate goal. While I have remained quiet for several years, I had also other purposes in view, and that was to free the Universal Negro Improvement Association of those racial barnacles who have eaten the movement like a cancer to the core. Thank God, we are now free from them. Out of the old gang that once dominated the Universal Negro Improvement Association there is not one left. Everyone has been gradually eliminated in process of curing a disease that was eating the race to death.

The New Movement

The new Universal Negro Improvement Association that is now rising will have none of the old gang as national or international leaders. Only those whose names shall be certified will we ask the international public of the race to accept. Whenever you are in doubt, write to the Headquarters of the Organization

It will take us fully ten years to put over the mighty work that is to be done-we must therefore have a tenyear plan. It must be the sacred duty of every man to hew to the line as far as this plan is concerned. Do not be discouraged. Do not follow foolish sentiment. Remember, where there is no vision the people must perish. It was vision that created the Black Star Line; it was vision that created the idea of colonizing Africa for the Negroes of America, the West Indies and Central and South America. If this vision had met with the support of the so-called intellectuals ten years ago, today there would have been no crisis economically for the Negroes of America, the West Indies or Central and South America. I bowed to deportation to give others a chance to do the great thing. They have failed. I am once more on the firing line. See my special notice to divisions and members on page 3.
