My visit to Geneva was fruitful, and I feel sure we have made friends there who are not going to rest until the reasonable things we aim at are accomplished.

### **Self-Determination the Aim**

We aim at self-determination, the right of self-expression, autonomy, and right thinking, but in the land of our fathers, a nation of our ow from the shuffling of the cards and from the forecast of the stars things are working in a way that hundreds of millions of my race need not feel any trouble much longer -because everything seems to be turning our way.




