Fellowmen of the Negro Race, Greeting:

Today the world stares the Negro in the face and demands of him an account of his stewardship.

#### World Has Left Us Behind

For thousands of years we have mixed with the rest of mankind and now when all the races are boasting of their individual and collective progress—the progress of modern times—the race to which we belong has, perforce, to take the hindmost position because of the lack of this world's goods.

#### Whites Rule With Brute Force

In the great achievements of this modern world the white man, as also the yellow man, can boast of his constructed empires and dominions; he can point to his prowess upon land and sea; his position in temporal affairs is secure, thus he is able to rule with pride and satisfaction to himself.

#### We Must Act or Be Lost

How long is the Negro going to be satisfied to be a slave and a serf? The call for an accounting of the stewardship of the race is now, and we must be up and doing, for if we are found wanting much longer our sacred cause of liberty will be lost to us forever.

#### No Color Line Within Race

Black men and women the world over, I am begging you to come together. There must be no color line within the race, there must be but the Negro. The Negro has been despised for centuries, but if he will only rise to the occasion today he will find himself a man tomorrow. Let Ethiopia stretch forth her

hands and call her children to attention and to arms—the arms of industrial and commercial might. Let no scattered son or daughter fail to answer the call, whether you are called black or colored, for there is but one race, the Negro race, that must triumph as soon as we rise 400,000,000 strong.

### **Conquer Your Portion of World**

There must be no East, no West, no South where the Negro is concerned—there must be a united race. Rise, Diegroes, in your industrial and commercial might and conquer your portion of the world! There is enough in the world for black, white and yellow. The white man has his share, the yellow man is getting his share, and the Negro must now organize and take his.

#### Africa the Envied of All

When I survey the world of political activity I see Africa the envied goal of all races. Africa, by the plan of the other races, is to to be the mart of exploitation, it is to be the "No Man's Land" of the races while Europe remains in the hands of the white man and Asia of the yellow man. Unconsciously the Negro slept for five hundred years, and thereby gave the impression to an envious and avaricious world that all were welcome to Africa, but today the Negro is fully awake and he is saying to all comers: "Thus far in Africa and no further."

#### **Africa Defies a Mad World**

Africa supplied forty million slaves to the Western world. Africa bled that others might live, but today Africa, through wounds inflicted, has recovered from her affliction and in the full strength of her manhood and womanhood is hurling her defiance to a mad world.



### South African **Problem Worse**

#### Nothing Being Done for Native Unemployed in the Union

DURBAN, So. Africa.--Report ent in by several Joint Councils to the S. A. Institute of Race Relations show that the problem of unemploy-ment among natives in the towns has grown rapidly during the last few months. Reports from rural areas also show that large numbers of natives have returned home for whom there is no land available, while the recent drought has aggravated the position very considerably. Enquiries in various parts of the country indicate that the proceeds of na-tive taxation for the current year will probably show a drop of between 20 and 30 per cent due to the extent of native unemployment and distress.

Considerable hardship is likely to be inflicted upon Natives who are unable to pay their general and local tax since total exemption is only given in cases of permanent inability to work. Unemployed Natives may be given further time in which to pay but the liability accumulates, so that a Native may find himself faced with demand for payment of two years' axes at once.

The recently published notice by the Minister of Native Affairs regarding the treatment of Natives who are unable to pay their taxes is heartily welcomed and will ease a little the unfortunate position of unemployed Natives. Nevertheless they feel that they are being hit on both cheeks for while they are suffering severely from the policy of displacing Native labor to make room for white unemployed they are also called upon to pay taxes, the means for which have been taken from them by the government.



# Says Mahatma Gandhi in

First Speech on Landing in India

#### **BULLETIN** Gandhi Jailed

BOMBAY, Jan. 4. -- Mahatma andhi was arrested under dramatic circumstances at 3 a. m. and borne away to prison; he predicted a "reign of terror," with British troops shooting natives; Vallabhai Patel, president of National Congress, was also seized.

Nationalists declared a general uspension of work, and thousands of shops in India were closed as a sign of mourning; government was prepared to outlaw the Nationalist Congress, and wholesale arrests of men and women adherents were expected.

British government of India would employ financial pressure, and not mere repression and arrests, London sources said; plans included refusal of railway, postal and telegraph facilities to Indian business firms aiding Gandhi.

BOMBAY, India-Mahatma Gandhi declared today that he would not flinch at sacrificing the lives of 1,-000,000 people to purchase the liberty of India.

The Mahatma made this statement to 50,000 white-capped Nationalists gathered in an open field to hear his first speech since his return from the London Round Table Conference. He spoke from a lofty platform made of stout bamboo poles, festooned with the Nationalist colors—white, red and green—and surmounted by a spinning wheel.

The crowd was considerably smaller than the audiences Gandhi adressed before he left for England and some observers said he had lost in prestige because of the failure of the London conference. In another speech this evening the Mahaima uttered what some of his hearers interpreted as a threat to withdraw all co-operation from the round table conference committees due to arrive in India in the near future unless the government repeals recent restrictive ordinances. Speakng before the Welfare of India League, Gandhi said he would advise co-operation with the committees if the ordinances were repealed, but, what I have learned after my arrival in Bombay leaves very little nope for co-operation unless I am to ose all sense of self-respect."

He declared he could not expect t be able to exercise the same amount of restraint as formerly if it came to taking a strong step. "In the last fight you had to face lathis (staves)," he said, "and in this fight ou will have to face bullets."


