Where There Is No Vision

It is said somewhere: "Where there is no vision the people perish." For many years we of the Universal Negro Improvement Association have preached among the Negro peoples of the world the doctrine of preparedness; in doing that we were buffeted and kicked, and scorned by many of the wiseacres who today find themselves, along with the unprepared peoples, in a state of economic bankruptcy.

Price to Learn and Understand

It is a pity that as a race we have to pay such a price to learn and understand; but when the worst is said and done, those of us who are in earnest to lead, must extend that sympathy that is necessary even though those to whom we may extend it might at some time or other have been our fiercest foes. As a race we are linked together in one common destiny and so we cannot allow any section or unit to suffer because of ignorance or selfishness.



New Govt. of China Formed

NANKING.-China turned away from the traditional militarism of her past today when the ruling National People's party (Kuomintang) set up a civilian government headed by Lin Sen, veteran statesman and revolutionary, who was educated in the United States.

Lin Sen has been acting head of the nominal government since the colapse of the Chiang Kai-shek dictaorship on December 14. He was chosen by the central executive committee of the party to be chairman of the national government, with powers corresponding to those of the President of France. He is sixty-seven years old and a native of Foo-

The selection of the government leaders, who will be inaugurated on January 1, was the result of a compromise between the Nanking branch of the party and the Cantonese fac tion, which has been in control of a rival government in the south since last spring. The Cantonese will exercise wide influence in the new regme, although Lin Sen is a membe of the Nanking group.

Chiang Gets Committee Post Chiang Kai-shek was chosen as one of the national government's new standing committee," have powers and functions not yet clearly defined but presumably of great importance. 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
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
