



MAYOR JAMES J. WALKER

Quite the most colorful figure in the public life of America today is s J. Walker, Mayor of the City omce that otherwise would be drab and boresome. Custom has taught the average American to view a successful public official as one who spends long hours of the day and a few short hours of the night seeing to it that the "eyes are dotted and the tees crossed" in every act of officialdom. After years of devotion to such routine, one's back becomes stooped, temples gray, arteries hardened and face drawn. Then he is a fit subject to be photo graphed and held before our youth as a successful public official-one to rmulate.

Not so with James J. Walker. Apart from devoting himself altoto the economic phases of his administrative work, he finds time to devote other elements. And while diversifying his activities and interests, the economic phase of his work suffers not the less. As host for the City of New York he is in a class by himself. Walker's attitude towards public office and service re-minds us more of the efficient Europeon conception of the duties and demeanor of a public official. He would have graced the Court of St. James with far more dignity and efficiency than will Andy (Gump) Mellon.

Walker is one public official in America who has taken cognizance of the social significance of his office. He is conscious of the fact that New York City has interests other than It is because of this attieconomic. tude that he takes, that New York City, to outsiders and to those at who have not altogether devoted themselves to money making, has some beauty and interest other than bricks, steel, mortar and concrete.

To properly function, a corporation the size of the City of New York, with its vast population, wealth, commerce and industry, requires a gigantic organization of men and money. Con-sidering this fact, it is quite natural that certain irregularities would creep into an organization of this size. The fact that the Hofstadter Committee has unearthed a few iregularities in the city administration does not warrant the generalization that the whole administration is rotten.

Traffic lights have been installed in Harlem on Fifth, Lenox, Seventh and Eighth avenues. Mayor Walker appointed seven colored men on the Harlem Park and Playground Com-

mittee. Over 3,266 Negro employees ar paid \$3,902,375 a year by the City of New York under the Walker re-




