OUR AIM IS FOR COMPLETE LIBERATION

Let Us Strike With a United Front for Full Freedom

Fellow-Men of the Negro Race, Greeting:

It falls to the province of every black man and every black woman to be a member of the Universal Negro Improvement Association, because there is but one purpose before us, which is the purpose of liberty—that liberty Patrick Henry spoke about in the Legislature of Virginia over one hundred and forty-six years ago. We, New Negroes, declare that we desire liberty or we will take death.

They called us out but a few years ago to fight three thousand miles away in Europe to save civilization, to give liberty and democracy to the other peoples of the world. And we fought so splendidly, and after we died, after we gave up our blood, and some of us survived and returned to our respective countries, in America, in the West Indies, in Central America and in Africa, they told us, as they told us in the past, that this country is the white man's country.

Position of Menials

What is it but menial opportunities for you where you live in contact with white men? Because they have told us that in America, because they have told us that in France, because they have told us under the government of Great Britain that our opportunities are limited when we come in contact with white men, we say the war is not over yet. The war must go on; only that the war is not going on in France and Flanders, but the war will go on in the African plains, there to decide once and for all in the very near future whether black men are to be serfs and slaves, or black men are to be free men.

We have decreed that black men are going to be free as white men are free or as yellow men are free. We have declared that if there is to be a British Empire, if there is to be a German Empire, if there is to be a Japanese Empire, if there is to be a French Republic and if there is to be an American Republic, then there must be a black republic of Africa.

Hide the Book From the Negro

The New Negro has given up the idea of white leadership. The white man cannot lead the Negro race any longer. We was able through our ignorance to lead us for over three hundred years since he took us from Africa, but the New Negro has learned enough now. When the white man took the black man from Africa he took him under a camouflage. He said to the Queen of England that he was taking the black man from Africa for the purpose of civilizing and Christianizing him. But that was not his purpose. The white man's purpose for taking the Negro from his native land was to make a slave of him, to have free labor. Some of us were brought to the Southern States of this country, some of our brothers and sisters were taken to Central America and others were taken to the West Indian Islands, and we labored under the bonds of slavery for 250 years. The white man did not school us for 250 years. He hid the book from us, even the very Bible, and did not teach the Negro anything.

The Negro Made a Rush for the Book

But God moves in a mysterious way, and He gave to us a Lincoln and a Victoria, and He said, "You must set those people free," and they did set us free. As soon as we were freed we made a rush to get the book, and we did get the book. We got the Bible first, and we began to sing songs and give praise to God, and that is why the Negro shouts so much in church. But after he was through with the first he got hold of the school book and went from his A B C to Z, and what has happened in fifty years? There is not a white man so educated that you cannot find a Negro to equal him. None in France, none in England, none in America to beat the Negro educationally, and because we stand equal with him we say no longer shall the white man lead us, but we shall lead ourselves.

Completing the Education of the Negro

If we had not a complete training in knowledge before 1914 in that we only knew the book and were only able to read and write, they of themselves gave us training and placed two million of us in the army and gave us gun and powder and taught us how to use them. That completed the education of the Negro. Therefore, now the Negro stands complete in education. He knows how to read his book, he can reason, plan and build, and he knows how to use the sword and the gun. And because he can do these things so splendidly, he is determined that he shall carve the way for himself to true liberty and democracy which the white man denied him after he was called out to shed his blood on the battlefields of France and Flanders.

Let us be ready then to act.

Howard 65 Yrs. Old in March

WASHINGTON, D. C.—On March 2, 1932, Howard University will be sixty-five years old. The university obtained her charter from the Federal government on March 2, 1867. The university this year will celebrate her birthday by dedicating three new women's dormitories which have been recently erected at a cost of \$770,000. These dormitories were opened for use at the beginning of the current school year and are said to be among the best equipped dormitories for Negro youth in the United States.

One of the features of the Charter Day celebration will be the annual dinner in the university dining hall, sponsored by the Washington alumni. Similar Charter Day dinners are held by Howard alumni all over the United States. In a statement given out today by President Mordecai W. Johnson, this Charter Day dinner is spoken of as one of the most inspiring occasions connected with the university life.

President Johnson's statement follows:

"During my administration the alumni of Howard University have cheerfully and effectively responded to every important call which I have made to them. At the beginning of my administration they were the decisive factor in completing the \$500,000 endowment for the Medical School. Last year, at my solicitation, they provided a distinguished gift for the Honorable Louis C. Cramton. The Annual Charter Day dinner at the university has been one of the most inspiring occasions connected with university life.

"At present I am most deeply interested in the effort of the General Alumni Association to provide a loan fund and a number of scholarships for needy students at Howard University. In Washington this work is being led by Mrs. Alma J. Scott, one of the most vigorous and efficient members of the Howard alumni organization. The general campaign throughout the country is being handled by Linwood G. Koger, alumni secretary. Mr. Koger is employed on a budget provided jointly and in equal shares by the university and the Alumni association.

"I am gratified to learn of the support which has been given the Alumni association by members of the I am looking forward with interest to the annual report of achievement which he will give at the close of the year. I have confidence that it will contribute to the pride and strength of the Howard University Alumni organization."

Girl Gets Nine Years For Bengal Shooting

CALCUTTA.—Bina Das, a 20-year old girl student who attempted to shoot Sir Stanley Jackson, Governor of Bengal, during a university ceremony a fortnight ago, was sentenced today to nine years rigorous imprisonment.

She pleaded guilty and before her sentence read a statement saying she fired at the Governor "impelled by love of my country, which is being repressed." She declared the act did great violence to her own nature.

"I am glad," she said, "the life of Sir Stanley was saved by Providence and Lady Jackson and her children have been spared their terrible misfortune, and I am glad to have attained my end without loss of blood."

She added she had no personal feeling against Sir Stanley as a man, but he represented "a system which has kept enslaved 300,000,000 of my countrymen and countrywomen."

Judge Benjamin Nathan Cardozo, chief justice of the New York State Court of Appeals, was named to the United States Supreme Court by President Hoover to succeed Oliver Wendell Holmes, retired.

Negro Alderman Ousted in Ill.

EVANSTON, Ill.—Alderman Edwin B. Jourdain, whose seat as a member of the Evanston council has been under contest ever since election last April, was ousted Monday by the city council in a 10 to 4 vote as a result of a protest made by Jno. Russ, white, whom he defeated by more than 300 votes.

The charge was made that more people voted in the Fifth Ward which Mr. Jourdain represented, than there were either voters registered or people residing. Some 135 ballots were declared suspicious. No proof as to how the irregularities came about was offered.

Mr. Jourdain has many staunch supporters. A special meeting was called by Prof. A. R. Hatton of Northwestern University of which Jourdain is a graduate, to protest the decision of the council. Prof. Hatton declared his protesting a disgrace and unfair.

Jourdain has announced already that he will immediately seek vindication at the next election. He will make the fight as much to clear his constituents of the charge of illegal elections as to secure the office for himself, Mr. Jourdain said.

Black Crows' Glands Treated

EDMONTON, ALB.—Nearly half the 262 crows released Nov. 26 by Professor William Rowan of the University of Alberta have been recovered, and details of their recovery support Professor Rowan's revolutionary doctrine of the cause of migration.

The crows were released in the course of an experiment to show that migration is an instinct which can be modified by treatment of the endocrine glands and many were treated in different ways.

One group of birds, treated with long hours of artificial light and serums designed to reverse their natural instincts, should, according to the professor's theory, have flown northward instead of following the south-east direction of normal crows.

These birds, with tails painted bright yellow to distinguish them from their differently treated brothers, showed the poorest percentage of capture, Professor Rowan said.

Whites Protest Unseating Of Negro Alderman

EVANSTON, Ill.—Seldom has this aristocratic North Shore district of Chicago witnessed a week of political excitement rivaling that which followed the action of the Evanston City Council last week in declaring vacant the seat held by Edwin B. Jourdain, Jr., Harvard University graduate, and the first colored Alderman ever elected in this city.

Evanson, rated one of the world's wealthiest suburbs, elected Mr. Jourdain to its City Council from the Fifth Ward in April, 1931, for a term of two years.

Last week the Evanston City Council decided that there had better be a new election in the ward, and declared the seat held by the young Negro Alderman vacant. A storm of protest arose, and some of the city's most distinguished white citizens led the way. Hardly had the Council announced that Mr. Jourdain had been unseated, when from every section of the city came plans for protest meetings.

Professor A. R. Hatton, head of the department of political science at Northwestern University, and one of America's foremost authorities on municipal government, nationally known as the "father of the city management plan," led the protest.

Burn Negro Church, Schools; Elloree, S. C., Under Curfew

ELLOREE, S. C.—Mayor E. E. Gasque today invoked a curfew law here following the burning of two Negro school buildings and a Negro church and a subsequent threat to burn another church. Any person on the streets between midnight and 5 A. M. will be subject to arrest.

Moroccoan Tribe Whips French Army in Battle

Racial Vote Ban Stirs Panama

BALBOA, C. Z.—The political situation in Panama became tense this week, with police ready to forestall a rising following the delivery of a note from Minister of Justice Guillermo Andreu, representing President Alfaro, to the electoral jury, asking reversal of the jury's attitude regarding the issuance of voting permits to native sons of foreign parentage.

A majority of the jury held it should issue permits only to those who registered at the Foreign Office their desire to become citizens, a move aimed primarily at preventing voting by sons of British West Indians.

The executive note says the jury exceeded its powers in establishing requirements beyond those provided by law. After quoting the law, the executive message recounts its efforts to bring about a fair election, saying "the executive power has awaited patiently rectification of errors, but it is painful to admit the waiting has been in vain. The cup is near to overflowing and will be made to overflow by that resolution of the electoral jury, should it be maintained."

The message continued that the executive would adopt "necessary means to prevent the elections being made a farce and the electoral corporations from perturbing the constitutional order of the republic in favor of their party."

A majority of the jury are Christians, representing the party which was ousted by the revolution of Jan. 2, 1931, and the minority, representing Dr. Harmodio Arias, bitterly opposed the resolution.

The government's action is seen as a sharp break with the Christians. The jury will meet tomorrow to consider the message. If it does not reverse its action the President may dissolve it and fighting might result. The police of Panama are being held in readiness for an emergency.

Disfranchisement in Okla. Fought by Race

MUSKOGEE, Okla.—Race voters of Wagoner County in this state will get their first opportunity to test the validity of registration laws passed in 1916 when a test case with more than 2,000 plaintiffs will be argued in the United States Federal Court for this district on February 29. The case arose out of the refusal of county registrars to permit race voters' names to be placed on the voting lists prior to the 1928 election.

The white registrars claimed that they were without authority to permit any person to register who had been 21 years of age and over and the resident of the state in 1916 who had not availed himself of the opportunity then afforded to have his name placed permanently on the registration books. Race voters excluded by such a ruling claim that when the law was passed in 1916 it was impossible to find precinct officers with whom to register their names.

King George Invited To Address Virginia

RICHMOND, Va.—Senator Norris told the State Senate that King George of England has been invited to deliver an address by radio to the General Assembly of Virginia as part of Virginia's celebration of Washington's Birthday.

First Negro Coroner's Jury in Mo. County

KANSAS CITY, Mo.—For the first time in the history of Jackson County, an all-Negro coroner's jury has been appointed to hold inquest of Negro deaths. In fact two juries have been appointed, each to serve alternately.

This achievement is due to no small effort on the part of the Kansas City-Jackson County Negro Republican Club of which Albert Johnson is president.

But Mr. Johnson gives a large share of the credit to Dr. Eugene Carbaugh, father of the county coroner, Dr. Glenn Carbaugh, for the appointment of the Negro juries.

Walker Given Clean Bill

Mayor James J. Walker today gave a clean bill of health today by an associate counsel to the Hofstadter Legislative Committee who, in resigning, offered a review of evidence uncovered by the legislative investigation.

Writing to Samuel Seabury, Henry T. Hunt, former mayor of Cincinnati, who was \$1,000-a-month assistant to the chief counsel, said:

"In my opinion sufficient evidence has been adduced that the Democratic organization of Manhattan, Brooklyn and Queens is one for the financial profit of its leaders.

"I except any evidence that may be available of corruption on the part of the mayor."

Chinese Army To the Front

NANKING, China.—The Chinese National Guard Division known as "Chiang Kai-Shek's own" reinforced yesterday for Shanghai to reinforce the 19th Chinese army.

The troops were fully equipped, all wearing steel helmets and carrying their own field guns.

Japan Anxious To Make Peace

SHANGHAI.—Japanese army and naval officers are meeting generals of the Chinese Nineteenth Route Army to discuss terms for ending the fighting here, but since the Japanese are expected to demand that the Chinese withdraw twenty kilometers (12.4 miles) from Shanghai the outcome of the conversations is regarded as doubtful.

Meanwhile, both the Japanese and Chinese are continuing to mass troops and supplies. Japanese soldiers are rapidly replacing Japanese sailors on the Chape front and three Japanese air fields have been cleared between Shanghai and Woosung. The Chinese assert they have 120,000 troops in the Shanghai-Woosung area.

Chinese official circles asserted they had information that Lieut. Gen. Kenkichi Uryeta had cabled to Japan saying it was impossible for him to conduct a successful campaign here without three divisions of reinforcements.

Foreign military observers have wondered how many more Japanese soldiers could be sent to China before Japan would have to mobilize her reserves. These observers pointed out that already nearly twelve Japanese divisions were on duty outside the country proper, leaving only five divisions at home.

Japanese army and naval communiques have become noticeably meager. Most of the official Japanese statements are largely devoted to propaganda, presenting Japan's case or offering damaging statements toward China.

MORE JAP TROOPS

TOKIO.—Japanese troops in Shanghai will have to be reinforced to meet the menace of gathering Chinese forces, Foreign Minister Kenkichi Yoshizawa announced.

Inflict 34 Casualties

RABAT, Morocco.—Fourteen French soldiers were killed and two officers and eight men were wounded by hostile tribesmen in a skirmish in Southern Morocco, it was learned here.

The troop detachment was attacked while on the way to establish a post in the recently pacified Ferkla region. The tribesmen suffered heavy losses.

Fire Negroes, Whites Demand

JACKSONVILLE, Fla.—Four hundred unemployed white men marched through the streets here recently in a violent demonstration aimed at driving Negroes from their jobs, but police bullets and a Negro's knife, which wounded one demonstrator severely, ended the outbreak.

The crowd first appeared at a building Negro workers were tearing down and demanded the employer that the laborers be discharged and that white men be hired in their stead. The employer refused, and the men then proceeded to drive the Negroes away. As the march proceeded through the streets, trucks and automobiles driven by Negroes were hit and the drivers were routed with blows and kicks.

Eventually, a Negro, chased into a corner, drew a knife and slashed his pursuer. Police arrested two men described as the leaders, and thereafter the crowd gradually dispersed.

St. Thomas Objects To Woman Appointee

ST. THOMAS, Virgin Islands.—Miss Lucy Gillette arrived here today to serve as Public Welfare Commissioner, despite the protests of the Municipal Committee to Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, Secretary of the Interior.

"The Emancipator, a local newspaper, assails the 'presumptuous individualism' of Governor Pearson in recommending the appointment, declaring that it is 'against the protest of the people of St. Thomas and members of the Colonial Committee, through the Municipal Committee, that this woman is still forced upon us.'"

"The objection to Miss Gillette was based upon her being a Southerner and she is charged of intense race prejudice."

Ask for Negro Jurors in St. Louis Federal Courts

ST. LOUIS.—A committee of lawyers from the Mount City Bar Association Saturday petitioned Federal Judges Faris and Davis to order the inclusion of colored citizens on grand and petit juries in the St. Louis federal courts. The judges referred the request of the committee to the commissioners.

Judge Faris hesitated to make an order to the commissioners, but he assured the committee that the law was in their favor. The commissioners are James J. O'Connor, clerk of the courts, and Fred Roessler, of the Mercantile Commerce Bank and Trust Company.

On the bar association's committee were Attorneys George L. Vaughn, chairman; Freeman L. Martin, S. R. Redmond and John A. Davis.

"Packed by White Labor Only" Draws Protest

Stores when it was called to their attention that the tomatoes had printed on the label the phrase "packed by white labor only." The company apologized to the stores and wrote a sharp letter to the Cross Roads Canning Company, Berkley Springs, W. Va., demanding an explanation for the insulting phrase on the label.
