Makes Salary Cuts

According to an announcement made by James H. Hubert, executive director of the New York Urban League, the executive committee has authorized salary cuts ranging from five to thirty per cent on all salaries above \$1,000. This step was made necessary because of loss in income, especially from Foundations and big gifts usually carried on the budget as "assured income." This is, according to Mr. Hubert, the second cut, as a general five per cent cut was effective in September, 1931.
