# Gov. Roosevelt **Strength Grows** On Each Ballot

Governor Franklin Delano Roosevelt of New York loomed as a positive victor at the Democratic Convention in Chicago, to lead the Democrats of the nation next November, to capture the Presidency from the twelve-year grip of the Republicans. On the third ballothe lacked only 84 votes to win with two-third majority.

As we go to press (July 1) Gov. Roosevelt has been increasing his strength on each ballot. On the first ballot Roosevelt received 6664 against Al Smith, the lead-ing opponent, who received 201. On the second ballot Roosevelt reon the second bands toosever, re-ceived 677% ballots, gaining 111/2, and Smith, 1944. On the third ballot Roosevelt further increased his strength to 682% and Smith dropped down to 190%.

## **WOMANLY WISDOM** BY HAZEL ESCRIDGE

A few years ago it was generally thought by men of our race, particularly, that a normal school education or its equivalent was sufficient for women. Many of them went so far as to discourage women from going in for higher education, especially professions.
