Gov. Roosevelt Nominated as A Bold Leader

Governor Franklin D. Rooseveit was chosen the standard bearer of the Democratic party during the Presidential election next November. He was nominated on the fourth ballot by the biggest majority ou record. He was selected by a vote of 945. The two-thirds rule required only 769 1/3. His running mate is the present Speak. er of the House of Representatives, J. N. Garner of Texas.

Mr. Roosevelt flew to Chicago from Albany with his entire famlly to deliver his acceptance speech to the delegates. He was wildly cheered when he appeared to speak. In doing so, the nominee broke the tradition of waiting to "be notified" of his nomination. He also hoped that other foolish todaitions would be broken by the Democrats.

He delivered the frankest ac eptance speech in which he told the delegates that he stood 100 per cent behind their platform. He reasserted that he and his party stand for all the people and not for the privileged few. He also advocated bold plans for the rehabilita-tion of the country, especially by developing the forest resources of

the country.

He promised a stirring campaign, always focussing his attention with a picnic Thursday, July tion on the issues confronting the people, and not dodging any major one of them.

They have realized that the destinies of their sons and daughters are bound up in the whole, rather than the part. For the final truth as to the whole, they look to the Negro press, which has at last come

into its own.

THE GREAT PITY The pity is that every Negro does not read and support his own papers. There should not be a Negro home today without a Negro weekly coming into it, especially if that home has any paper at all coming into it. Propaganda is one of the greatest weapons of the modern world. The Press is the greatest instrument for the spreading of propaganda we know of. If we are to mould public opinion in favor of our cause, there is no more effective method than by the use of our literature,

IF WE WANT THE TRUTH
We must make our own way in literature. If we leave it to others to write about us, and what we think, say and do, they will color it from their racial viewpoint, and it will not always flatter us nor tell the unvarnished truth about us. To get the truth, we must write for ourselves the story of ourselves.
